

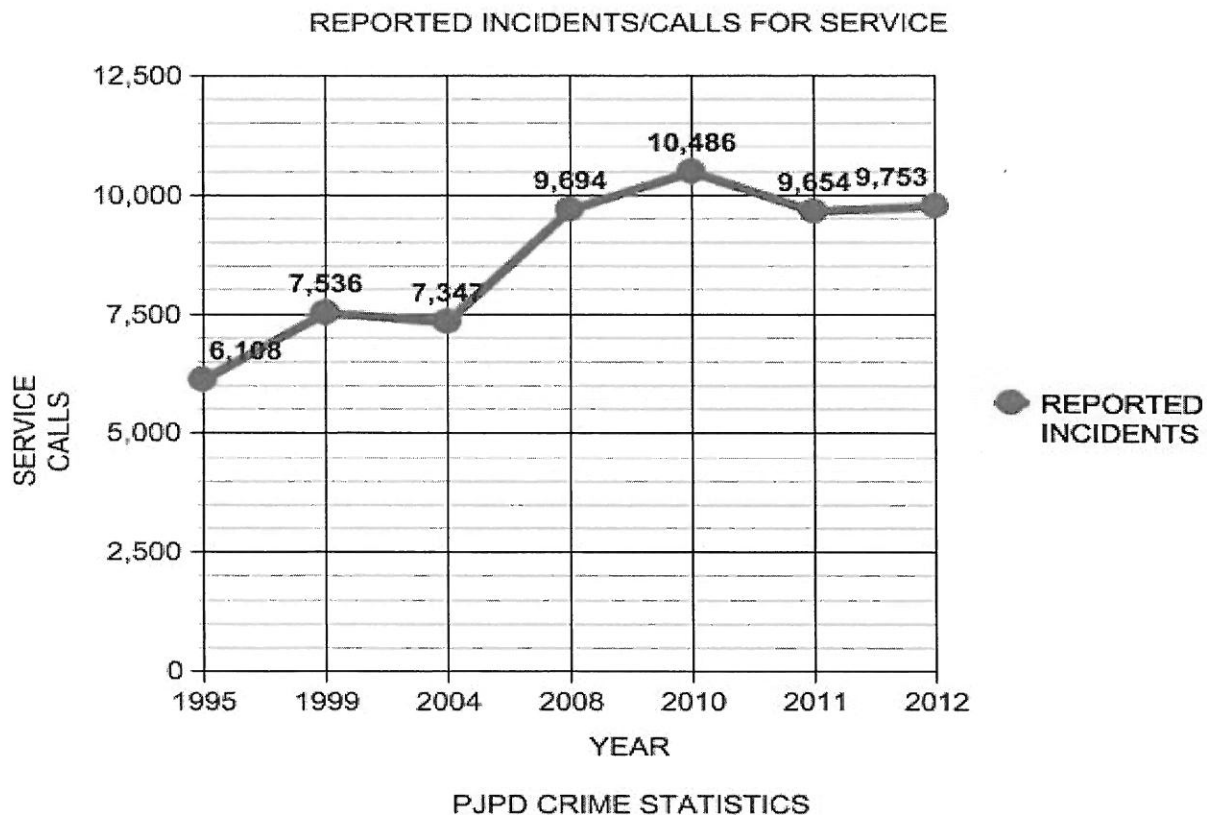

Annual Statistics / Calls for Service

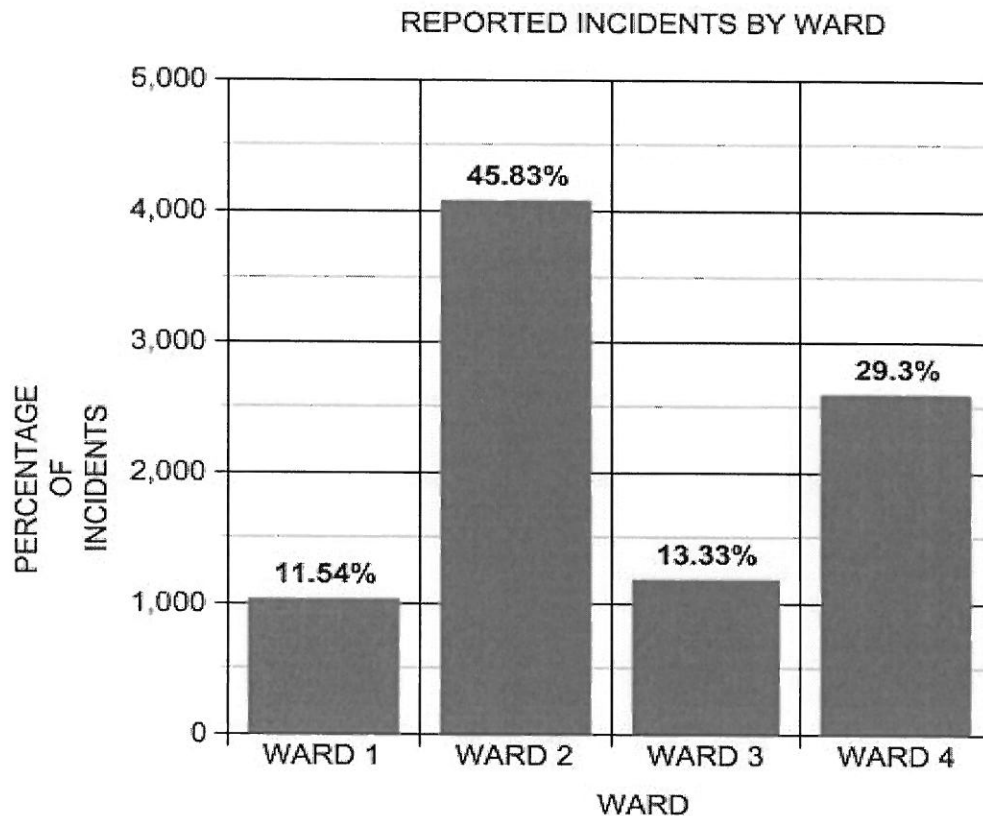
In 2012, City Police responded to and investigated 9,753 incidents and calls for service, representing a 1% increase from 2011 and a 59.6% increase from 1995. Statistical analysis of Impact Computer Records indicates the hours from 2:00pm through 10:00pm experience the highest volumes of calls for services and case reports initiated with the 8:00pm-10:00pm time frame being statistically the busiest. Generally, when a call for service is required, central dispatch and officers will file a report known as a "Blotter Report". Table 1 illustrates a history of reported calls for service from 1995-2012.

Table 1: Reported Incidents 1995-2012



Computer generated data reveals that the City's Second and Fourth Ward account for 74% of all incidents and calls for service in comparison to the City's First and Third Wards. This disparity, in part, can be explained resulting from the unique mix of residential, business, parks, and high density traffic patterns that are present in these wards. Table Two represents the total percentages of reported incidents generated by ward.

Case reports are filed by officers and detectives to document the occurrence of a crime or offense, or complex incidents that involve further investigation. In 2012, a total of 1,883 Offense/Case Reports were filed. These reports include the investigation of 511 felony offenses, 885 misdemeanor offenses, and 1,115 violations offenses, warrant investigations and serious occurrences not involving an offense. (Note: one case may involve multiple crime levels). Below is a breakdown of case reports filed by ward:

- Ward 1: 12.9%
- Ward 2: 45.9%
- Ward 3: 9.8%
- Ward 4: 31.2%

Crime Statistics

The Uniform Crime Report (UCR) contains official data on crime and criminal offense information that is reported by law enforcement agencies across the United States to provide data to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). UCR is a summary-based reporting system, with data aggregated to the city, county, state, and other geographic levels. Each month, law enforcement agencies report the number of known index crimes in their jurisdiction to the FBI. This mainly includes crimes reported to the police by the general public, but may also include crimes that police officers discover, and known through other sources. Law enforcement agencies also report the number of crime cases cleared. For reporting purposes, criminal offenses are divided into two major groups: Part I offenses and Part II offenses.

In Part I, the UCR indexes reported incidents in two categories: violent and property crimes. Aggravated assault, forcible rape, murder, and robbery are classified as violent while arson, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft are classified as property crimes. Part 1 crimes are collectively known as Index crimes, this name is used because the crimes are considered quite serious in nature, tend to be reported more reliably than others, and are reported directly to the police.

In Part II, the following categories are tracked: simple assault, quality of life offenses, forgery and counterfeiting, disorderly conduct, driving under the influence, drug offenses, fraud, gambling, liquor offenses, offenses against the family, prostitution, sex offenses, stolen property, criminal mischief, weapons offenses, and all other offense classifications.

Many factors may contribute to fluctuating levels in Part I and II Offenses. These factors include weather, economic conditions, unemployment rates, alcohol and drug abuse, proactive community policing and enforcement initiatives, new technologies and patrol presence.

In 2012, the City experienced an overall **decrease** in Part I reported offenses by 12% in comparison to 2011. However, these reductions were generated largely by a reduction in the property crime offense of larceny by 23.3%. This large decrease may be attributed to a multitude of factors to include high visibility patrolling and investigative techniques and increased citizen crime prevention efforts as driven by police and neighborhood watch advisories and education alerting citizens to these thefts and teaching them basic crime prevention techniques to prevent them. Part I violent criminal acts related to Robbery, Rape, and Aggravated Assault have **increased** by 72% as compared to 2011 while the crime of burglary remained statistically the same.

Part II Offenses: 2011-2012 Comparison

Part II Offenses have decreased by 14.2% in comparison with 2011. Part II Offenses range from offenses related to the sale and possession of controlled substances, fraud, stolen property, assault, criminal mischief, disorderly conduct, quality of life offenses, to driving while intoxicated.

A percentage of Part II Offenses are generated through proactive police patrol such as driving while intoxicated, quality of life offenses, and crimes in progress that officers may detect during their respective tours. Throughout 2012, the patrol division operated with a 25-35% vacancy rate due to injuries and other vacancies that greatly impacted the volume of proactive, patrol initiated contacts.

Criminal Arrests:

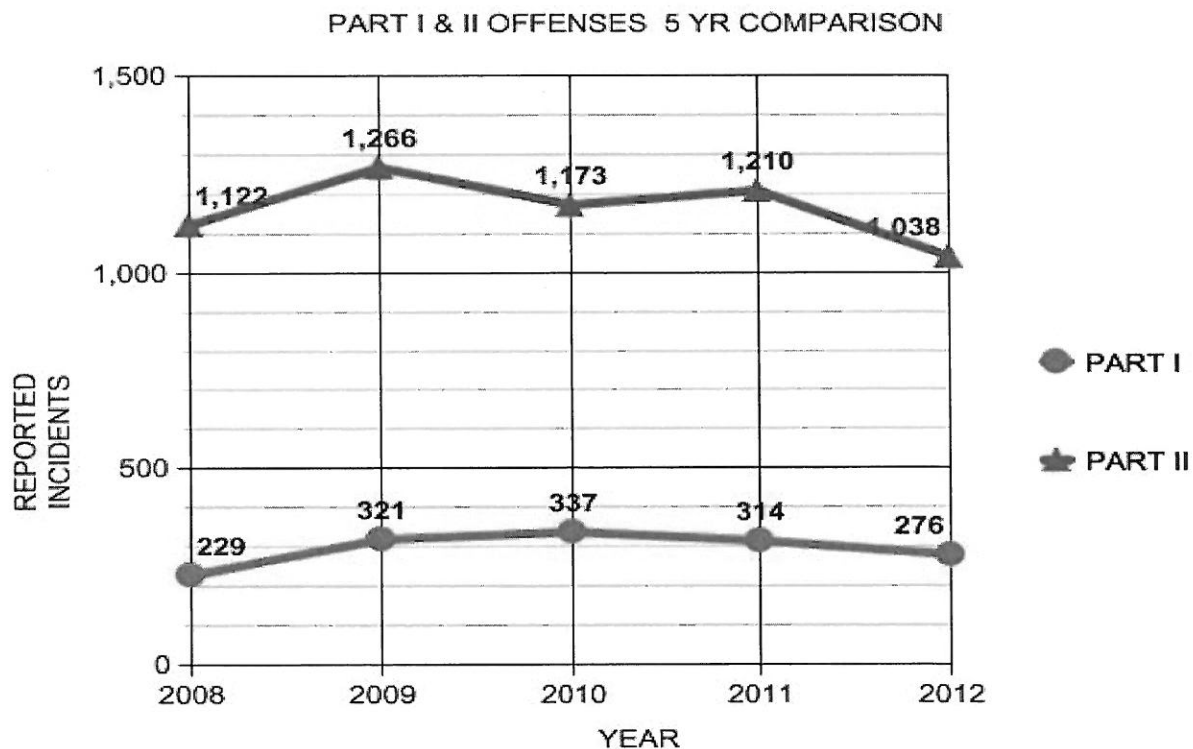
A total of 1,216 adult offenders were arrested in 2012 representing a 15.6% decrease from 2011.

Of these arrests, the following charges were filed:

- 267 felony
- 484 misdemeanor
- 1,617 violations, bench warrants and other agency warrants.

Adult offenders are those age 16 and above that commit a violation, misdemeanor or felony offense. Charges filed by officers ranged from city code violations, driving with a suspended driver's license to Murder in the Second Degree.

Juvenile Crime

The purpose of the Juvenile Aid Bureau is to provide positive crime prevention initiatives coupled with proactive intervention and criminal investigation strategies to address issues of juvenile crime and disorder. A Juvenile Detective is responsible for the day to day activities conducted within the Juvenile Aid Bureau and is assisted as needed by DARE Officer Scott Robertson and uniformed police officers. In addition, the Juvenile Aid bureau works closely with an array of community service organizations, non-profit institutions, county agencies, the Port Jervis City School District and the Port

Jervis Recreation Department to provide proactive intervention services to prevent and address juvenile criminality.

Proactive intervention services and positive youth outreach and educational programs continue to be the primary focus of our juvenile aid services. Outreach services including DARE, Child Identification, School Crime Prevention and Citizen Presentations, National Night Out, Youth Basketball, Halloween Safety, and Bicycle Safety are a small sample of the positive outreach services that our juvenile unit provides to build positive relationships and educate our city's youth to help them grow into adults. Positive outreach and intervention has contributed greatly to the following juvenile contacts in 2012:

- Overall Youth Contacts: 19.2% decrease
- Felonies and misdemeanor arrests: 21.25 % decrease
- PINS, 22% decrease
- Runaway Investigations 53% decrease

2012 Traffic Safety Initiative Summary

During 2012, the Port Jervis Police Department utilized grant funding to participate in state and county traffic safety programs in an effort to reduce aggressive and distracting driving and target those individuals who operate a motor vehicle while the influence of drugs or alcohol. Speeding, operating a motor vehicle while using cellular telephone, failure to yield the right of way to pedestrians in crosswalks, driving while intoxicated, and other aggressive driving behaviors have been the core focus of departmental enforcement and educational efforts to reduce accidents in our community. The following list represents a summary of traffic safety initiatives that the department participates in:

- Speed Studies/Speed Monitor Deployments
- Buckle Up New York (BUNY) Seat Belt Enforcement Initiatives
- Proactive Traffic Enforcement Details targeting speeding, cell phone use and pedestrian crosswalks.
- Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) targeting aggressive and distracted driving behaviors that result in accidents in targeted areas.
- Orange County Stop DWI Patrols and joint border to border activities with the Eastern Pike Regional Police Department.
- NYS Operation Safe Stop School Bus Safety Program
- Traffic Safety Presentations
- Back to School Speed and Pedestrian Safety Enforcement

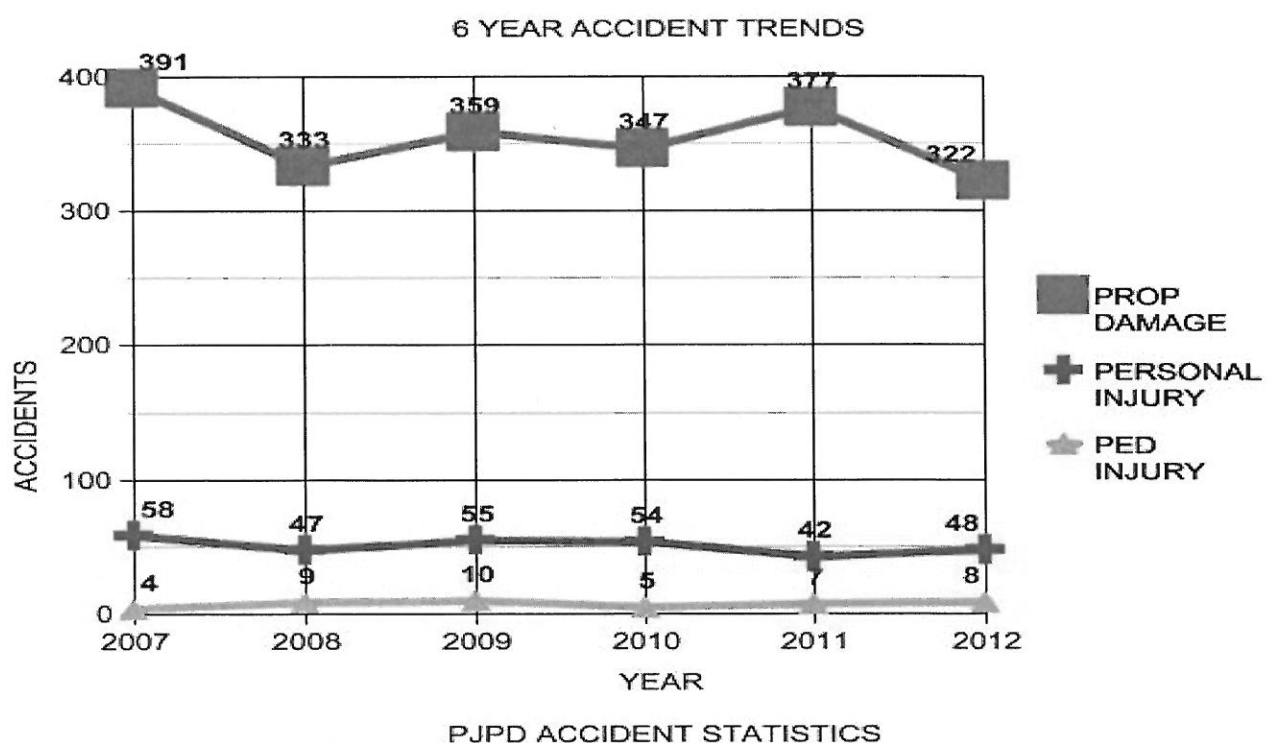

In 2012, a total of 378 accidents were investigated by the Port Jervis Police representing an overall 11.2% decrease from 2011. Of these, 322 incidents involved property damage to automobiles, 48 incidents involved personal injury to occupants or drivers of motor vehicles and 8 incidents involved a pedestrian being struck by a motor vehicle. In comparison with 2011, property damage auto accidents decreased by 14.5%, and personal injury auto accidents increased by 14%.

A five year review reveals property damage auto accidents decreased by (-17.6%) while accidents involving personal injury decreased by (-17.2%) revealing that public education and proactive enforcement initiatives have a positive impact on traffic safety.

In addition, the Port Jervis Police Department issued 188 permanent and 26 temporary disability handicap parking permits to city residents in 2012.

Animal Control

During 2012, the City of Port Jervis created a part time animal control officer position to enhance animal control related services to our community. Mr. Robert Murray completed an extensive basic training program provided by the Port Jervis Police, the Port Jervis / Deerpark Humane Society, Tri-State Veterinary Group and the New York State Agriculture and Markets Division to prepare him for the array of domestic animal and wildlife challenges that occur in our community. ACO Murray works in partnership with our long serving Animal Control Officer Barry Longwell to proactively address quality of life issues related to animals such as vicious animals, dogs at large, failure to license or vaccinate, failure to clean-up after one's dog, and animals in parks. Crime Prevention & Outreach

Providing crime prevention and community outreach is an essential component of our overall crime reduction strategy. Crime Prevention Officers and rank and file police officers work closely with community organizations and our thriving neighborhood watch groups to provide valuable crime prevention information and awareness to our community partners. Building partnerships fosters trust and enables effective problem solving. Officers routinely attend and participate in community events to provide positive outreach and build partnerships. The following summary is a description of the many positive community programs that our department attended and participated in:

Honor / Color Guard

The Port Jervis Police Department Honor/Color Guard demonstrates the pride, commitment and community service of the men and women of the Port Jervis Police Department. In 2012, the members of this highly regarded team participated in the city's formal swearing in of elected officials and fire officers, Veterans Memorial Day Parade, Orange County Police Academy Graduation ceremony, Orange County Stop DWI Conference, Fraternal Order of Police Officer Memorial Services, and proudly led the Port Jervis Fire Department's Annual Inspection Day Parade in a joint color guard presented by police officers and armed service members of the Tri-State Naval Ship-VFW. The Department additionally participated in a joint color guard with members of the Town of Deerpark Police Department during the Town's annual 9/11 memorial services.

Police Unity Tour – National Police Week Participation

Sergeant Christopher Sargente and Officer Jason Vicchiariello joined hundreds of law enforcement officers from around the nation to participate in the Police Unity Tour, a four day, 320 mile bicycle ride from East Hanover, NJ to Washington, D.C. The Police Unity Tour is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to raising awareness about police officers killed in the line of duty and to supporting the National Law Enforcement Officer's Memorial and Museum.

The memorial and museum, located in Washington, D.C., was established in 1983 by an act of the United States Congress and serves to honor the more than 19,000 men and women who have been killed while performing their duty as police officers within the borders of our nation. At the heart of the memorial is a blue-gray marble wall with the engraved names of all slain officers including Officer John Mechechnie who was killed in the line of duty on March 17, 1947 in the City of Port Jervis.

The officers were later joined by Officer Jeffery Legato, a member of the Port Jervis Police Department Color/Honor Guard, who participated in the memorial ceremony and event.

Senior Fraud Presentation

Port Jervis Police Officers conducted a series of crime prevention education pertaining to the topic of senior safety and fraud prevention to our community's senior residents located at the Port Jervis Senior Club, Water's Edge Apartments, and Hillside Terrace Apartment Complex. This popular crime prevention program will be continued in 2013 to provide senior citizens with essential safety tips and fraud prevention education to reduce victimization among our senior citizen population.

Women's Self Defense Seminar

On April 14th, the department co-sponsored a Women's Self Defense Seminar with our partner, Master Mike Barnhard and his professional staff from Han Ho Martial Arts Studio located in Slate Hill, NY, to provide basic self defense awareness and techniques to prepare, prevent and defend from a physical or sexual assault.

Drug Abuse in our Community

On May 9, 2012, the Port Jervis Police Department partnered with the Port Jervis Neighborhood Watch and the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council of Orange County (ADAC) to sponsor a community crime prevention and education seminar titled: Drug Abuse in Our Community, A Call to Action Battling the Prescription Drug Abuse and Heroin Epidemic. Approximately 100 citizens attended this event that provided a multi-disciplinary examination of the prescription drug and heroin abuse epidemic that is sweeping across our country and community to address crime, addiction, and the number of tragic overdose deaths that occur in our community.

The event was moderated by Mr. James Conklin from ADAC of Orange County with presentations conducted by the following speakers: Ms. Samantha Rys-Restorative Management Corp, Ms. Gina Matthews and Mr. Martin Colavito-Catholic Charities, Mr. Andrew Marotta and Mr. David Marr-Port Jervis City School District, Ms. Vicki Landman and Ms. Brenda Tribus-Bon Secours Community Hospital, Ms. Jill Gamboni-Child Death Review Team of Pike County-Reality Tour, Det. Michael Worden-Port Jervis Police Department.

Community support generated as a result of this important crime prevention topic resulted in the creation of the Port Jervis Community Drug Abuse Task Force with Wickham Methodist Church Pastor Robin Martineau selected as the group's leader. With the assistance of the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council of Orange County and a group of dedicated community residents, the Port Jervis Community Drug Abuse Task Force is a highly motivated, grass-roots organization that will work vigilantly to provide a community approach to address addiction in our community.

Port Jervis / Deerpark Police Department Joint DARE Program

The Port Jervis Police Department, Town of Deerpark Police Department and the Port Jervis City School District partnered to develop a multi-agency Drug Abuse Resistance Education Program for all 5th grade students that attend Anna S. Kuhl and Hamilton Bicentennial Elementary Schools. This

partnership is a result of the elimination of the School Resource Officer position within the school district resulting from budget cuts, and is scheduled to begin during the 2012-2013 school year.

Youth Safety Day

A youth safety day conducted during the month of May at Engine 4 Fire Station was a partnership of the Port Jervis Police, the Port Jervis Neighborhood Watch, and the Port Jervis Fire Department, to provide essential safety skills focusing on pedestrian and bicycle safety and fire safety. A Bicycle safety obstacle course, free helmets, bicycle locks, literature, and fire fighter demonstrations were provided.

National Night Out Against Crime Celebration

The Port Jervis Area National Night Out Against Crime Committee held our 6th annual National Night Out celebration on Tuesday, August 7, 2012 at 6:00pm at beautiful Riverside Park located in the City of Port Jervis. 2012's event was attended by over four thousand people and fifty community based organizations. A Port Proud to Be Drug Free March was held prior to the event with several hundred participants.

National Night Out Against Crime, which is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch and co-sponsored locally by the City of Port Jervis Police Department, is held on the first Tuesday of August and involves more than 15,000 communities from all 50 states with over 37 million participants. This event is designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness, generate support and participation in local anti-crime efforts, strengthen neighborhood spirit and police/community relationships, and send a strong message to criminals that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

National Night Out is a celebration of our community's commitment to improving the quality of life for our residents, especially our youth, through the promotion of positive, healthy life styles. This can only be accomplished through building strong partnerships between the community, local health and human service providers, faith based organizations, local businesses, schools, civic organizations and the law enforcement community. Crime, drug abuse, and disorder are a community problem, and together, we can effectively address the needs of our community. We are confident that we can make a difference and send a clear message that we are united, we are strong, and that we are committed to making the Tri-State community a safe and healthy place to live and raise our families.

National Night Out has proven to be an effective, inexpensive and enjoyable family oriented program to promote neighborhood spirit and community partnerships in our fight for a safer community. The community benefits of this event extend well beyond the one night and throughout the year!

Project Free Bicycles

Project Free Bicycles was a collaboration of the Port Jervis Juvenile Aid bureau, Port Jervis high School and the generous financial donation from local resident, Mr. Edward Smith, for the purposes of rehabilitating thirty-two bicycles that we distributed to Port Jervis School district children in need during the Christmas Holidays.

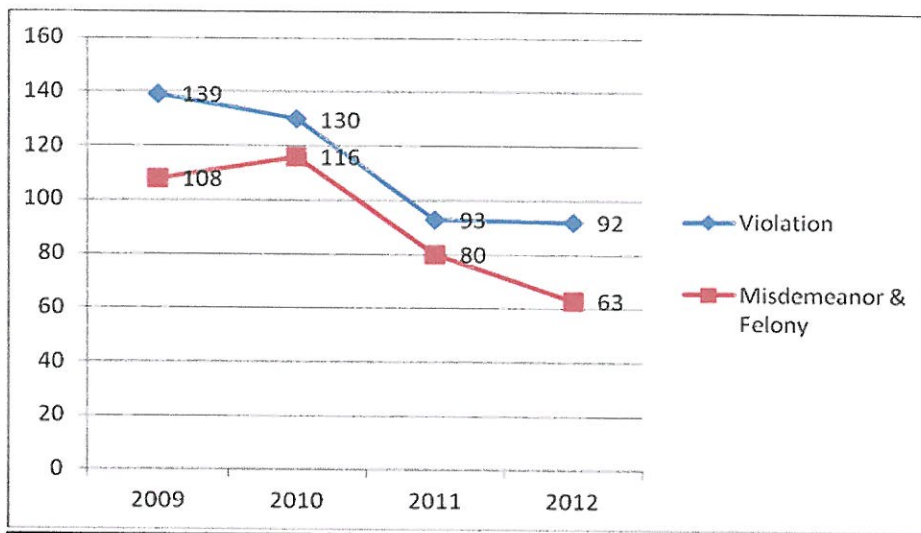

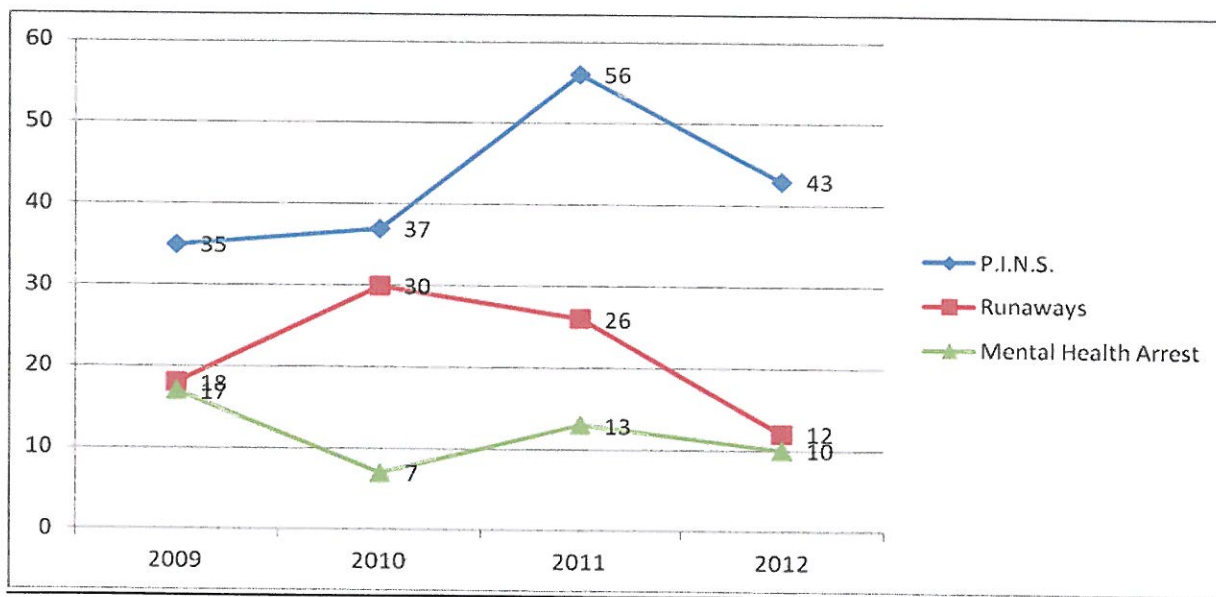

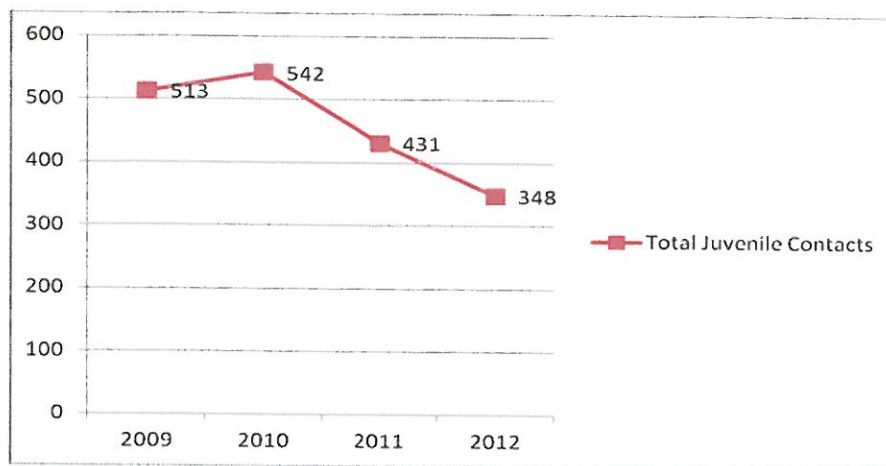
Violation, Misdemeanor & Felony arrests

2012 DETECTIVE DIVISION REPORT

Extraditions:

Detectives conducted the following extraditions in 2012:

- 3 persons returned from New Jersey for robbery 1st and robbery 2nd charges.
- 1 person was returned from Pennsylvania for a burglary 2nd charge.

Search Warrants:

During 2012, detectives obtained a total of 18 search warrants from Port Jervis City Court. These warrants were for a variety of investigations, including narcotics, weapons, homicide, robbery, stolen property, and DNA identification (buccal swabs)

Death Investigations:

Detectives conducted 13 death investigations during 2012. These investigations are conducted in conjunction with the Orange County Medical Examiner's Office. Of these investigations, one resulted in a homicide arrest.

On September 24 at 11:20 A.M., police responded to a residence on Ball Street for a report of an unresponsive 13 month old child. Upon arrival police immediately assisted EMS in rushing the child to Bon Secours Hospital where the child was pronounced dead. Detectives commenced an investigation with the OCME office into the circumstances surrounding the death. On October 2, 2012, detectives charged Brett Kanoff, age 22, the child's father, with murder in the second degree for the intentional murder of his child, Cameron Kanoff. Brett Kanoff was later indicted by an Orange County Grand Jury on multiple homicide related charges and is presently waiting trial.

Trials:

Todd Sinclair, indicted for the 2011 murder of Randy Kizer, stood trial in Orange County Court in 2012. Police officers and detectives from Port Jervis provided testimony during the trial which resulted in verdict of 'guilty' on the top charge of murder in the second degree. Sinclair was later sentenced in early 2013 to 25 years to life in prison.

Selected Cases:

Jacob Singer, age 23, of Honesdale, PA, was arrested by detectives on May 15, and charged with burglary 2nd in connection to an April 29, 2010, residential burglary on Jersey Avenue. Singer was identified as a suspect based upon a DNA match between Singer and blood evidence collected at the scene. Singer was later indicted by an Orange County Grand Jury and is presently waiting trial in Orange County Court.

Thomas Grau, age 24, was arrested by detectives on November 29 and charged with burglary 3rd in connection to an October 6, 2009, commercial building burglary. Grau was identified by a DNA match with blood evidence collected at the scene. His case is presently pending.

Both matches were based upon DNA profiles developed from evidence collected at the crime scenes being matched to a DNA offender profile in the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS).

Presently, detectives are working additional cases where DNA matches have yielded investigatory leads and identified potential suspects.

Heather Martin, age 26, of 223 East Main Street, was arrested by detectives on August 31 after an investigation into a structure fire at 223 East Main Street on August 28. Martin was charged with Arson 2nd and later indicted by an Orange County Grand Jury. She pled guilty early in 2013 to Arson 3rd and was sentenced to 5 to 15 years in prison.

Michael Gerlach, age 32, of Sparrowbush, NY, was arrested by detectives on December 6, after an investigation into a November 19 robbery at the TD Bank on East Main Street. Gerlach was charged with Robbery 1st and later indicted by an Orange County Grand Jury. He is presently waiting trial in Orange County Court.

Carroll Dolshun, age 26, of Huguenot, was arrested in the early morning hours of February 26 after a report of a home invasion on Hammond Street. Dolshun was charged with burglary 1st and several other crimes and later indicted by an Orange County Grand Jury. He pled guilty and is serving seven years in state prison.

Grover Pemberton III (a/k/a Third), age 31, was arrested at his residence on Second Street after detectives executed a search warrant at that residence. During the search police turned up a handgun and narcotic drugs. Pemberton was charged with numerous weapon and narcotics related offenses. He later pled guilty in Orange County Court and was sentenced to three years in prison.

Controlled Substances:

Charges filed for controlled substances related offenses:

- 68 charges for criminal sale of a controlled substance.
- 38 felony level possession charges.
- 35 misdemeanor level possession charges.
- 12 misdemeanor level charges involving paraphernalia, hypodermic instruments.

Marihuana Charges:

The following marihuana related offenses were charged in 2012:

- 2 felony level sales charges.
- 7 misdemeanor level charges.
- 42 violation level charges.

Investigations:

Port Jervis detectives conducted multiple on-going investigations in 2012, some of which are still on-going. Several joint investigations were conducted with other law enforcement agencies, including the New York State Police Community Narcotics Enforcement Team, the Eastern Pike Regional Police Department, the Pike County Detective Bureau, the New York State Department of Health, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Trends:

Port Jervis is following a national trend with the prevalence of prescription narcotic abuse. However, over 2012 it is noted that narcotic prescription drugs abuse is beginning to decline while abuse of heroin is increasing. This is a disturbing trend, and is being driven by several factors:

1. Reformulation of certain prescription narcotics to make them difficult to crush or liquefy (injection and/or inhaling are common ways these drugs are abused).
2. Cost of prescription narcotics, depending upon the substance, can be substantially higher than heroin.
3. Close proximity to New York City and surrounding urban areas, especially in New Jersey, where heroin is prevalent.
4. Purity of the heroin has been reported by users to be 'excellent' compared to what users have encountered in previous years.

5. Heroin, depending upon the source, can be obtained relatively cheaply. A prescription narcotics abuser who gravitates to heroin will be able to, depending upon the source, purchase heroin at a cost well below that of prescription narcotics.

To illustrate this, heroin seized in 2012 amounted to an estimated street value of \$21,840, which is a 215% increase over 2010 and 2011, which combined was \$6,920.


Seizures:

A significant seizure of heroin in early 2012 resulted in one of the largest seizures of heroin in Port Jervis. On February 2 a 'no knock' search warrant was executed at a residence at 34 Hammond Street. The search warrant was the culmination of a joint investigation with the Eastern Pike Regional Police and the Pike County Detective Bureau into the interstate trafficking of heroin. Nydia Acevedo, age 38, of 34 Hammond Street, was arrested in Pike County while in the process of delivering heroin to an undercover police officer. Port Jervis detectives then executed the search warrant at her residence, which resulted in the recovery of 832 decks of heroin with an estimated street value of \$16,640. Acevedo is presently incarcerated in Pennsylvania and charges in New York are pending.
