The Port Jervis City Police Department is successfully lowering crime rates, traffic crashes, overdose deaths and fear of crime through the deployment of a proactive, community based strategy that incorporates:

- Partnerships and problem solving
- Education, prevention, community outreach
- Prioritizing safe, responsive consistent staffing levels and deployments
- Proactive Patrols and Investigations
- Progressive Training and Professional Staff development

Part I & Part II Reported Crimes

Part I UCR index incidents are reported in two categories: violent and property crimes. Aggravated assault, forcible rape, murder, and robbery are classified as violent offenses while arson, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft are classified as property crimes. Part I crimes are collectively known as Index crimes as these crimes are considered quite serious in nature, tend to be reported more reliably than others, and are reported directly to the police.

Part II Offense categories represent a multitude of less serious offenses and are tracked as follows: simple assault, quality of life offenses, forgery and counterfeiting, disorderly conduct, driving under the influence, drug offenses, fraud, gambling, liquor offenses, offenses against the family, prostitution, sex offenses, stolen property, criminal mischief, weapons offenses, and all other offense classifications. Many factors may contribute to fluctuating levels of Part I and II offenses. These factors include weather, economic conditions, unemployment rates, alcohol and drug abuse, proactive community policing and enforcement initiatives, new technologies, proactive investigative and patrol presence and increased citizen crime prevention efforts.

A deficient aspect of the UCR is a statistical accounting measure known as “The Hierarchy Rule”. When more than one offense occurs within an incident, only the most serious crime contributes to the agency’s monthly crime totals. For instance, if a case involved a burglary, assault and theft, our agency would count only the highest offense committed, bur-



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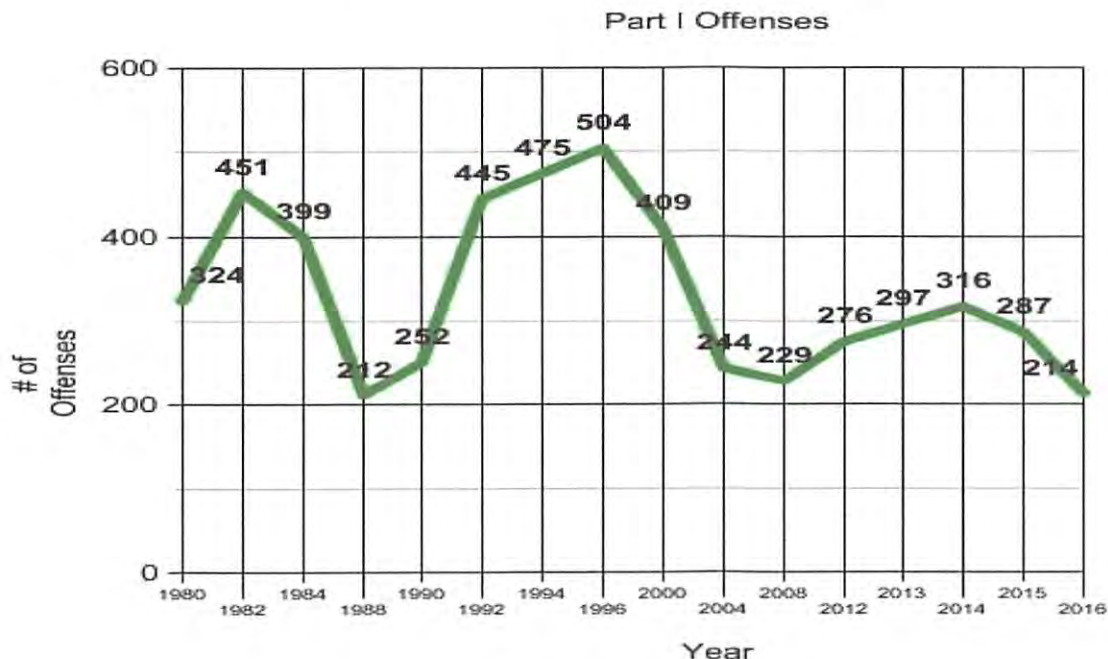
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glary, of the multiple offenses occurring in this single incident for the monthly totals because burglary is the highest offense on the hierarchy. For reporting purposes, the highest single offense committed is reported even when multiple offenses are committed. The Hierarchy Rule does not provide a true accounting of offenses and the department will be investigating the feasibility of transferring to the FBI's National Incident Based Reporting System in the future.

Reductions: Year 2016

- 36% from a peak in 2010
- 25% from 2015
- 32% from 2014
- 57.5% from 1996
- Violent Part I Offenses reduced by 38% and Property Offenses reduced by 24%
- Burglaries increased slightly in 2016 from 2015 but down overall from 2013 by 34%

Part II Offenses

In Part II, the following categories are tracked: simple assault, drug sales and possession, quality of life offenses, loitering, embezzlement, forgery and counterfeiting, reckless endangerment, endangering welfare of a child, disorderly conduct, driving under the influence, frauds, gambling, liquor offenses, offenses against the family, prostitution, sex offenses, stolen property, vandalism, and weapons offenses. Part II Offenses have increased substantially in areas including controlled substances, disorderly conduct, DWI and quality of life offenses due to increased proactive patrols coupled with rapid reporting by citizens of crimes and incidents while in progress.

Proactive enforcement of controlled substance related arrests for possession and sale of controlled substances increased by 31% from 2015 and by 77% since 2012. Part II Offenses overall increased by 23%. Between 2010-2016, the City experienced a range of reported PART II offenses from 103 to 1285 total offenses with an average of 1,143 offenses. 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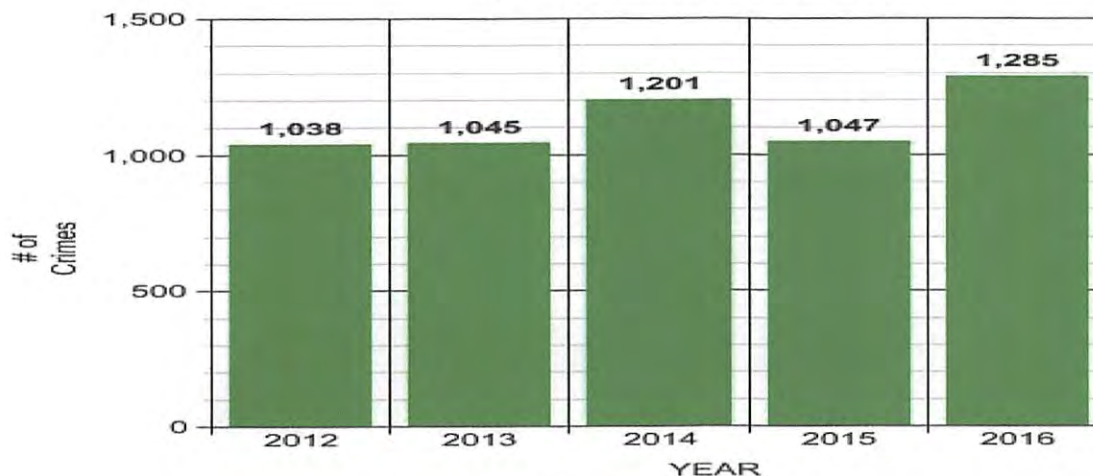

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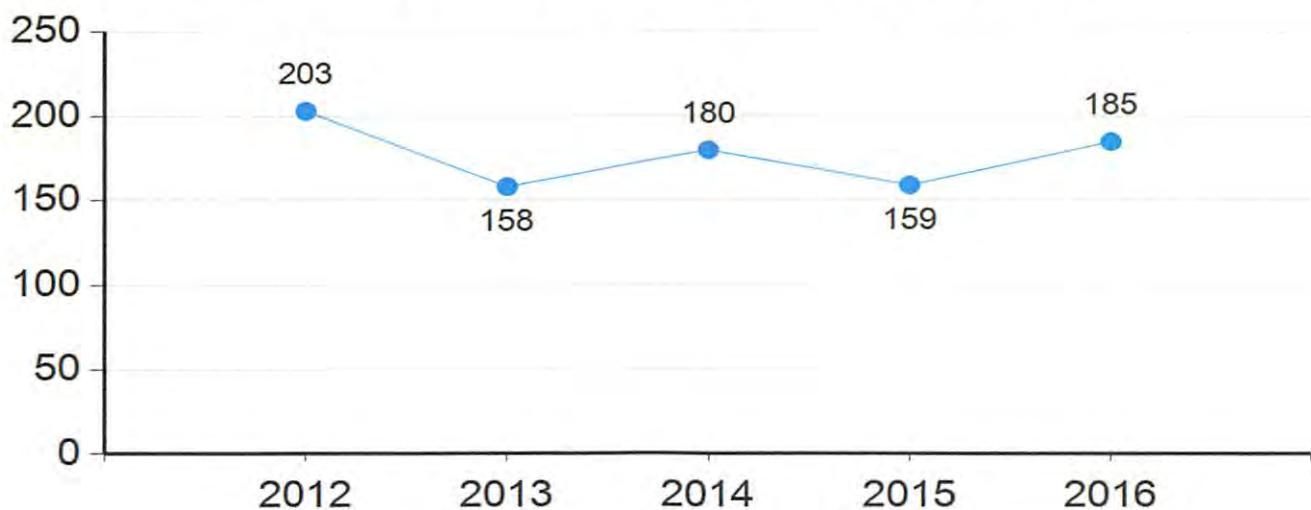
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Domestic Violence Intervention- DART Program

The Department investigated 402 reported incidents involving a domestic disturbance in 2016. Of these investigations, it was determined that 185 incidents resulted in the commission of a criminal offense. Simple Assault and violations of Orders of Protections are common offenses encountered by officers investigating these complex crimes. However, since 1995, City Police have investigated 6 homicides attributed to domestic/intimate partner related violence. Domestic Violence continues to be a challenge that will be addressed by the Port Jervis City Police Department through enhanced training and collaboration with Safe Homes of Orange County and the Orange County District Attorney's Office by participating in a grant award to create Domestic Abuse Response Team DART Intervention Program creating an enhanced and proactive domestic response team to address intimate partner violence in our community and provide increased safety assessments, reporting, access to victim services and incident follow-up to reduce the incidents of intimate partner violence and death.

Domestic Violence Victim Data (2012 - 2016)





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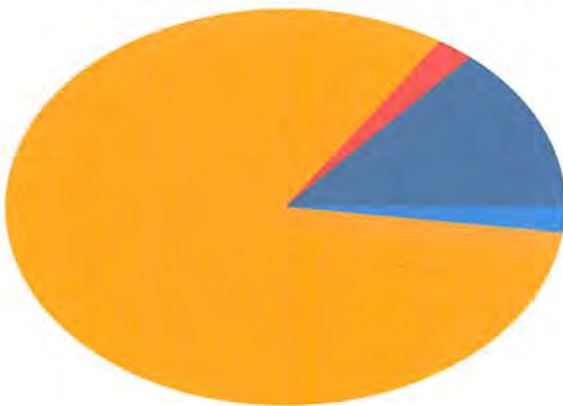

Calls for Service

Calls for service include activities reported by residents or the police ranging from minor noise complaints, disturbances, crimes in progress and traffic crashes. In 2016, City Police Officers investigated 12,422 calls for service representing a 104% increase since 1995 and a 69% increase since 2004. Calls for services historically peaked in 2014 and have decreased slightly by 2.3% as compared with 2015.

An analysis of 2016 call records reveals that the time from 2pm-10pm and the specific time frame 2pm-4pm contain the highest call volumes. Blotter types to include disturbances, harassments, domestic disturbances, larceny, community policing, medical aided, suspicious person's, noise complaints, drug investigations, peace keeping, and well-being checks account for a significant portion of calls, with the majority of calls being initiated by telephone calls to our seven-digit emergency line, E-911, walk-in traffic and officer initiated in the field. The following graph represents a historical time line of call volumes originating from 1995. The table below represents the call volume experienced in 2016 per each city ward:



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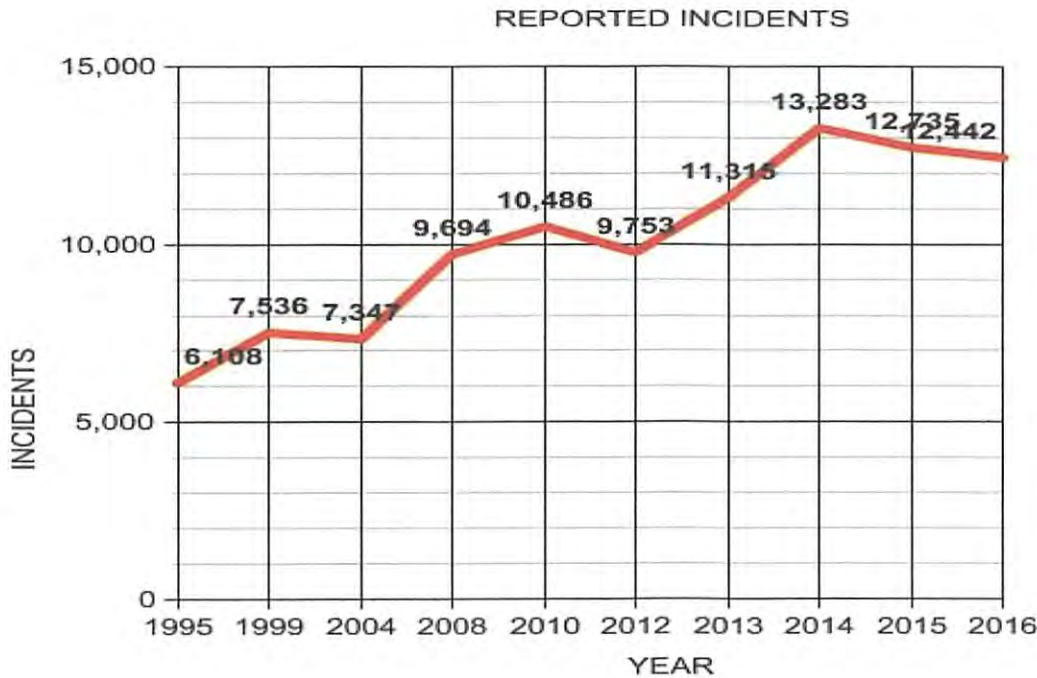

Criminal Arrests

1,615 adult offenders, ages 16 and above were arrested in 2016 representing a 29.3% increase from 2015 and a 75% increase from 1995. 300 felony charges, 754 misdemeanors, and 1,339 violation/other category charges were filed ranging from disorderly conduct to serious felony offenses including burglary and robbery. The following graph provides a historical comparison of adult arrests from 1995-2016:

Community Policing combined with increased emphasis on proactive shift deployments and staffing, Neighborhood Watch Participation and increased quality of life, traffic and narcotics enforcement have contributed to positive reductions in major crimes including burglary, robbery, theft, and aggravated assault.

Traffic Safety

A vital mission priority is to provide continuous efforts to improve traffic safety and facilitate the safe movement of vehicles, bicycles, and pedestrians throughout the City. These are the primary goals of the traffic enforcement initiatives conducted by members of the patrol division. In addition to the highly visible uniformed patrol officers deployed throughout the city, patrol officers participate in a variety of county and state initiatives targeting accidents causing behaviors, impaired driving, and improving pedestrian safety.

During 2017, the Port Jervis Police Department utilized grant funding to participate in traffic safety programs in an effort to reduce aggressive and distracting driving and target those individuals who operate a motor vehicle while under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Speeding, operating a motor vehicle while using cellular telephone, failure to yield the right of way to pedestrians in crosswalks, driving while intoxicated, and other aggressive driving behaviors have been the core focus of departmental enforcement and educational efforts to reduce accidents in our community.

Prevention and educational activities are an important role of our traffic safety program. Officers provide information at events, appearing at speaking and demonstration engagements throughout the year, and teach both pedestrian and bicycle safety to our children through various programs in cooperation with our schools and neighborhood watch groups.

The department deploys high visibility patrol traffic enforcement missions during assigned shifts and utilization of grant funding to combat accident causing behaviors using crash data to focus enforcement efforts based upon times of the day, days of the week and streets where crash data is most problematic. In addition, public education is provided through individual officer contact during traffic stops, media press releases and social media campaigns to improve safety.

In 2016, accidents involving property damage were reduced by 8.8%, auto accidents involving personal injury were reduced by 25% since 2012 and no fatal accidents have occurred since 2011. In addition, increased enforcement efforts have resulted in the increased apprehension of drivers with a suspended or revoked driver's license privilege by 85% from 157 in 2015 to 291 in 2016.

Crime Prevention & Outreach – Building Partnerships and Solving Problems

Providing crime prevention and community outreach is an essential component of our overall crime reduction strategy and mission priority. Crime Prevention Officers and rank and file police officers work closely with community organizations and our thriving neighborhood watch groups to provide valuable crime prevention information and awareness to our community partners.



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Building partnerships fosters trust and enables effective problem solving. Officers routinely attend and participate in community events to provide positive outreach and build partnerships. In 2016, Officers attended and or participated in community meetings, school and educational events including career days and youth safety lectures. In addition, officers are extremely active during their off-duty hours in youth and community oriented groups, coaching and in religious based organizations. By proactively promoting community partnerships, crime prevention, and supporting our community at various outreach venues, officers are given the opportunity to reduce barriers and improve communication with our residents leading to improved police services and a better quality of life for our community. -Be Part of the Solution: If You See Something-Say Something: Building Police-Community Partnerships

- The City of Port Jervis launched a public awareness campaign titled "Be Part of the Solution" to enhance and build relationships in the community and demonstrate that residents of our city play a vital role with reducing crime and the fear of crime by partnering with the police department in their efforts to detect and deter criminal activity throughout the City of Port Jervis.

-Too Good for Drugs Prevention Program

- Launched by a collaborative effort of Port Jervis Police Department, Operation PJ Pride, ADAC of Orange County, Bon Secours Community Hospital, Catholic Charities and the Port Jervis Middle School/City School District, this program is an evidence based prevention program that pairs police officers with prevention specialists to provide effective education and interaction with 8th grade students.

-DARE Program: Drug Abuse Resistance Education-ASK Elementary School 5th Grade

-Youth Safety Day- Police, Fire, Neighborhood Watch Youth Safety Programs

-10th Annual National Night Out Against Crime Celebration

- In 2016, a collaborative effort of Operation PJ Pride, National Guard Counter Drug Task Force, CVS Pharmacies and the City of Port Jervis resulted in the installation of a 24-hour prescription drug collection "drop box" outside the Port Jervis Police Department vestibule to provide a safe and anonymous mechanism to encourage residents to dispose of unwanted and unused prescription medications.

-Port Jervis Neighborhood Watch Program and Crime Prevention Seminars

-Senior Safety and Crime Prevention Program

A positive, proactive approach to improving the quality of life in our community involves solution oriented thinking and team work. Community members, business members, local non-profit organizations, churches, health and human services, educational institutions, senior citizens and our youth working in partnership with the Port Jervis Police, local government, Community Development, the Building & Codes Office, Recreation Department, Department of Public Works and other governmental entities are essential components to solving problems. These groups are aligned together guided by a mission to improve the quality of life for our community by addressing the underlying causes of crime and disorder.

The community plays a vital role in suppressing crime in our city as the police represent only a small part of the solution. A citizen armed with knowledge, keen perception and the ability to report suspicious activity provides an effective force multiplier and crime suppression tool. By working together proactively in a positive manner, we can collectively develop solutions, foster hope, reduce crime, and ultimately address crime and quality of life issues more effectively and efficiently through improved trust and bonds between the community and the police officers who serve them.

It is our goal to continue fostering positive approach to solving problems within our city, maintaining a high quality of life for all citizens and increased involvement by residents in their neighborhoods, wards, business districts, and Neighborhood Crime Watch Programs. Positive interaction and community involvement will foster relationships and a climate where crime and disorder are not tolerated nor welcome in this community. Through increased public collaboration, potential criminals will see that the police and the community are partnered and actively working together to become "Part of the Solution".



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2017 Goals / Projects / Priorities

1. Continued Proactive Patrol Deployments, Shift Staffing and investigative initiatives to proactively suppress crime and disorder in our neighborhoods.
2. Continue to proactively and aggressively address the opiate epidemic and projected rise of crack cocaine use and its negative effects on quality of life through partnerships and proactive targeting of narcotics dealers with other law enforcement agencies and enhanced prevention and education programs through partnerships with Operation PJ Pride, Neighborhood Watch, collaboration with treatment and prevention services to provide the DARE Program and Too Good for Drugs Program in our schools, continue the emergency deployment of Naloxone.
3. Obtain a new canine team and train/equip officer to deploy a dual certified patrol-tracking/narcotics canine.
4. Obtain funding to enhance the City Surveillance Camera System replacing existing infrastructure and adding cameras to strategic locations in our downtown business areas and intersections.
5. Prioritize Training Programs to enhance officer safety and public service utilizing a combination of training resources to include in-service training venues, in-house programs, shift training and on-line training.

Major Training Initiatives:

- ✓ Enhance Mental Health Awareness and Response through increased training by committing officers to the 40 hour CIT Training Program and enhancing policy development,
 - ✓ Utilizing grant funding to purchase and deploy Police Protective Equipment in Marked Patrol and Unmarked Support Vehicles and train all officers with the proper use and deployment of this equipment during advance multi-agency active shooter response training.
 - ✓ Enhance Domestic Violence Response through participation in the DART Grant Initiative with Safe Homes of Orange County through increased partnerships and collaboration, training and response to victims of intimate partner violence.
6. Utilize grant funding to construct a firearms and tactics training facility at the department firearms range located on Canal Street.
 7. Launch the pilot "Youth Police Leadership" Academy Program during July 2017.
 8. Develop a Police Chaplaincy Program to improve officer wellness, community relations and services provided with the assistance of our faith based community.
 9. Partner with the Orange County District Attorney's Office, Operation PJ Pride, Port Jervis Neighborhood Watch to enact a Reality Tour Drug Prevention Program in the City of Port Jervis similar to the Reality Tour of Pike County.
 10. Increased utilization of social media to provide positive public engagement.

2016 Port Jervis Police Department Awards

The Port Jervis Police Department has held their annual Traffic Safety Awards and Annual Review by the Department Awards Committee for the 2016 year of service. The Department Awards Committee, consisting of members representing all sworn ranks within the department consisting of Patrol Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant and Chief of Police, performs an annual review of enforcement activities, major incidents, investigations and arrests and responses to medical emergencies and public service.

Referrals of exceptional acts and service are made to the Awards Committee and each submission is carefully reviewed by the committee members to determine if an award of commendation is warranted and the level of award issued. The committee then refers their finding to Chief of Police for presentation to the selected award recipients.

The Department's Traffic Safety Program is modeled after the New York State Association of Chiefs of Police Program. It is designed to recognize outstanding commitment to traffic safety with the goal of preventing and reducing traffic related fatalities, injuries, crashes involved property damage and increasing pedestrian safety.

The Traffic Safety Program operates on a year to year basis. The Patrol Lieutenant reviews the yearly reports and presents his findings to the Chief of Police. The types of traffic infractions analyzed are designed to target common accident causing behaviors and improve overall traffic safety to include: aggressive driving, speeding, failure to yield pedestrians in crosswalks, driving while intoxicated/impaired by drugs or alcohol, and distracted driving behaviors such as texting while driving.

The Department recognizes six officers in the department for their outstanding commitment to traffic safety and commitment to traffic safety and driving while intoxicated enforcement efforts in an effort to make our streets safer for motorists and pedestrians.

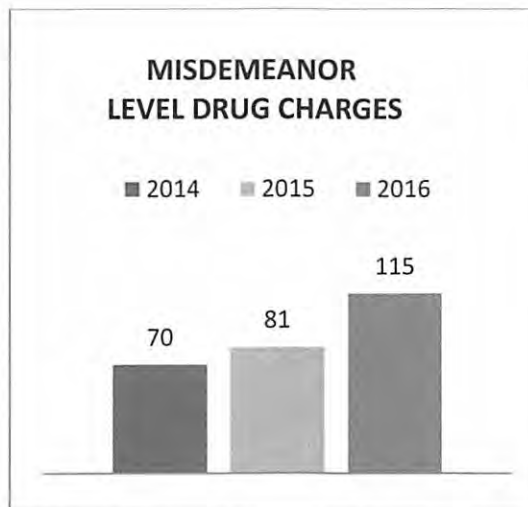
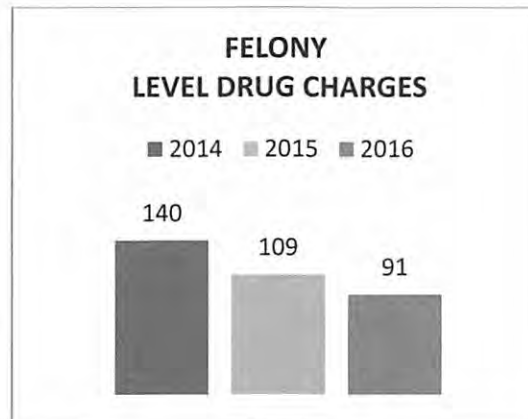
2016 REPORT OF THE DETECTIVE DIVISION

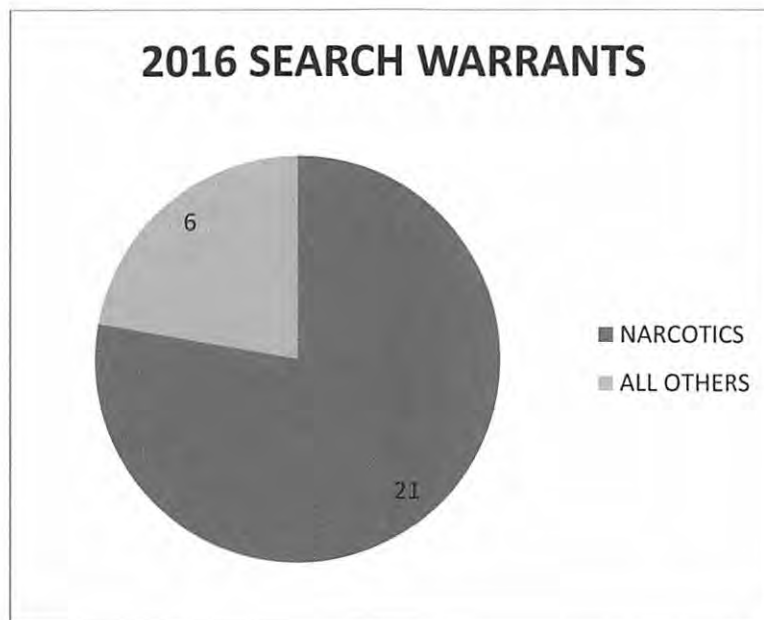

The efficacy of this approach is demonstrated by the number of felony level drug charges which detectives filed in 2014 - 2016, as well as the steady increase in the number of misdemeanor possession offenses which were filed department wide.



SEARCH WARRANTS

Detectives obtained **27** court ordered search warrants from either the Port Jervis City Court or the Orange County Court. Warrants were obtained for narcotics investigations, and for other cases such as child pornography, larceny, crime scenes, computers, and other offenses. The chart below demonstrates the breakdown of warrants by type in 2016.



FIVE YEAR COMPARISON SEIZURES OF CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES

Heroin remained the predominant drug of choice in Port Jervis with seizures doubling the amount seized in 2015. Crack cocaine and powder cocaine have remained steady. Through investigations that targeted several dealers, detectives seized quantities of the social drugs molly (MDMA) and LSD this year.

The following table provides a five year comparison for controlled substances seized by the Port Jervis City Police Department. Only common drugs of abuse are presented.

MAJOR CRIMES

A few selected cases are reviewed below:

January 4, 2016: **Matthew Ireland and Amber Bock:** These two were on a crime spree between Orange and Sullivan Counties. In Port Jervis they burglarized two storage units on Orange Street and stole the property inside the units. Detectives worked the case with the Sullivan County Sheriff's Office and arrested them. They both confessed to their crimes. Ireland was the leader of the two and received a sentence of 3-9 years in State prison. Bock received a combination sentence of time in the county jail and probation.

January 27, 2016: **Kevin Pelton:** Detectives investigated an overdose death on Mountain Avenue and learned that Kevin Pelton had injected a man with heroin, causing this person to overdose and eventually die. Pelton confessed to Detectives and was later sentenced to 1-4 years in State prison for his actions.

February 8, 2016: **Dennis Horner:** after working an investigation with the ATF for several months into the illegal sales of handguns and drugs, we assisted in the arrest of Horner for numerous federal charges including possessing a defaced handgun, felon in possession of a gun and lying to a federal agent. Horner is scheduled for sentencing on January 26, 2017 in Federal Court in White Plains.

February 25, 2016: **Jason Giordano:** a man wanted by New York State Parole moved into Port Jervis to sell heroin and crack cocaine. Giordano moved into a Lumber Street residence and began to sell large quantities of drugs within the City. Detectives arrested Giordano and then conducted a no-knock search warrant on his residence. Giordano plead to a drug charge and received a sentence of 3.5 years in State prison.

March 4, 2016: **Darren Biccum and Carolee Ruzanski:** after a lengthy investigation, detectives conducted a no-knock search warrant on their Ryan Street residence and seized a large quantity of heroin. They were charged with conspiracy and drug charges. They both plead guilty and received sentences of 6 years in State prison.

April 1, 2016: **Robert Burbridge:** Detectives executed a no-knock search warrant on Burbridge's Coleman Street residence and recovered drugs and an illegal pistol. Burbridge plead to a weapons charge on January 3, 2017 and in return will be sentenced to 4 years in State prison on March 22, 2017.

April 7, 2016: **Ronald Koch and Glendalyn Conklin:** Through a confidential informant, detectives purchased a handgun from Koch and Conklin at their Hammond Street residence. They plead guilty to a weapons charge and were each sentenced to 1-3 years in State prison.

April 13, 2016: **Robert Murray:** After a two month investigation, detectives arrested Murray on numerous charges relating to sexual activity with a minor. A search warrant was executed on Murray's cell phone and computers and he was additionally charged with possession of child pornography. Murray just took a plea to 18 months in State prison followed by 10 years of post-release probation.

April 19, 2016: **William Attreed:** After a lengthy investigation, a search warrant was served on Attreed who possessed a large quantity of heroin. Attreed's vehicle was seized and he plead to several drug charges and was sentenced to 5 years in State prison.

July 25, 2016: **Annabelle Nay:** after a reported stabbing on Ball Street, Nay was taken into custody and confessed to stabbing a local City resident and tried to kill her. Nay subsequently plead guilty to Assault 1st and was sentenced to 10 years in State prison.

September 2, 2016: **Nguyen Baez:** a resident of Lumber Street observed Baez exiting a front porch window and called the police. Baez was located by the patrol division and later confessed to detectives to being temporary employee from Kolmar Labs who was fired and broke into the house. Baez just plead to Burglary 2nd degree and was sentenced in December to 2 years in State prison and 2 years post release supervision.

TOWARDS 2017

The division is maintaining the aggressive approach towards narcotics enforcement for 2017. Working with the Orange County District Attorney's Office, detectives will also increase seizures of assets used in the commission of drug offenses, such as money and cars. Seizures are governed by strict laws and guidelines and are accomplished with the direct involvement of the D.A.'s office.

The division also seeks to continue working with the public, in particular the Neighborhood Watch groups and Port Pride, to ensure that tips and information is appropriately channeled and used in a timely manner.

With the increased presence of handguns, and the increase of police line of duty deaths nationwide in 2016, the division is also proactively targeting weapons possession. Removing guns and weapons from the street is vital to public safety and to the safety of officers. Because of the potential threat of violence, the department has used the Orange County Sheriff's Office Special Operations Group when executing high risk narcotic and weapons warrants. This excellent working relationship will continue in 2017. The division has also continued to work with the Pike County Drug Task Force, the New York State Police Investigators in Troop F and the Orange County Drug Task Force to go after individuals that may reside outside the City, but come into the City to sell drugs and or commit other crimes.

In a proactive initiative, detectives set up and conducted compliance checks with Orange County Probation and New York State Parole.

The goal of the division in 2017, in addition to closing criminal cases and assisting with the successful prosecution of those cases, is to maintain the momentum in the war against drugs in the City of Port Jervis, and to make Port Jervis an expensive and unpopular place to set up shop to sell drugs.

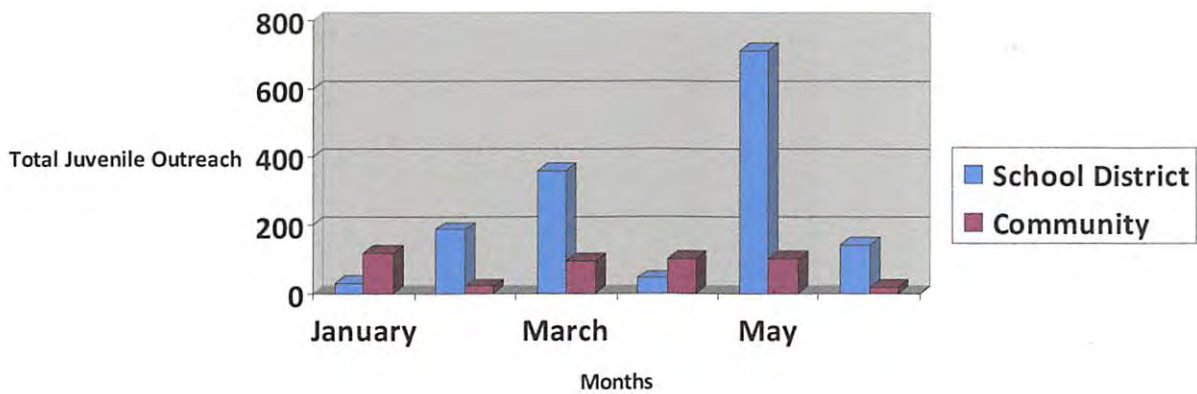

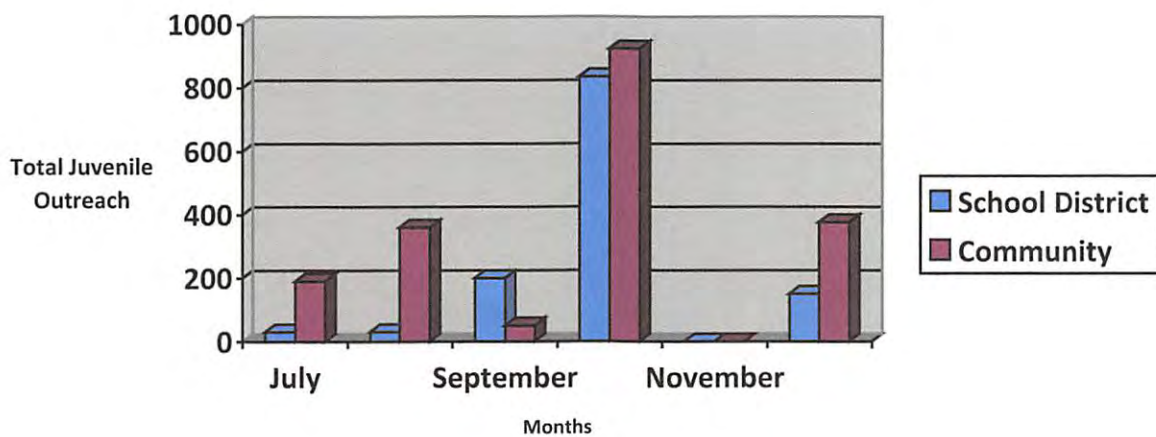

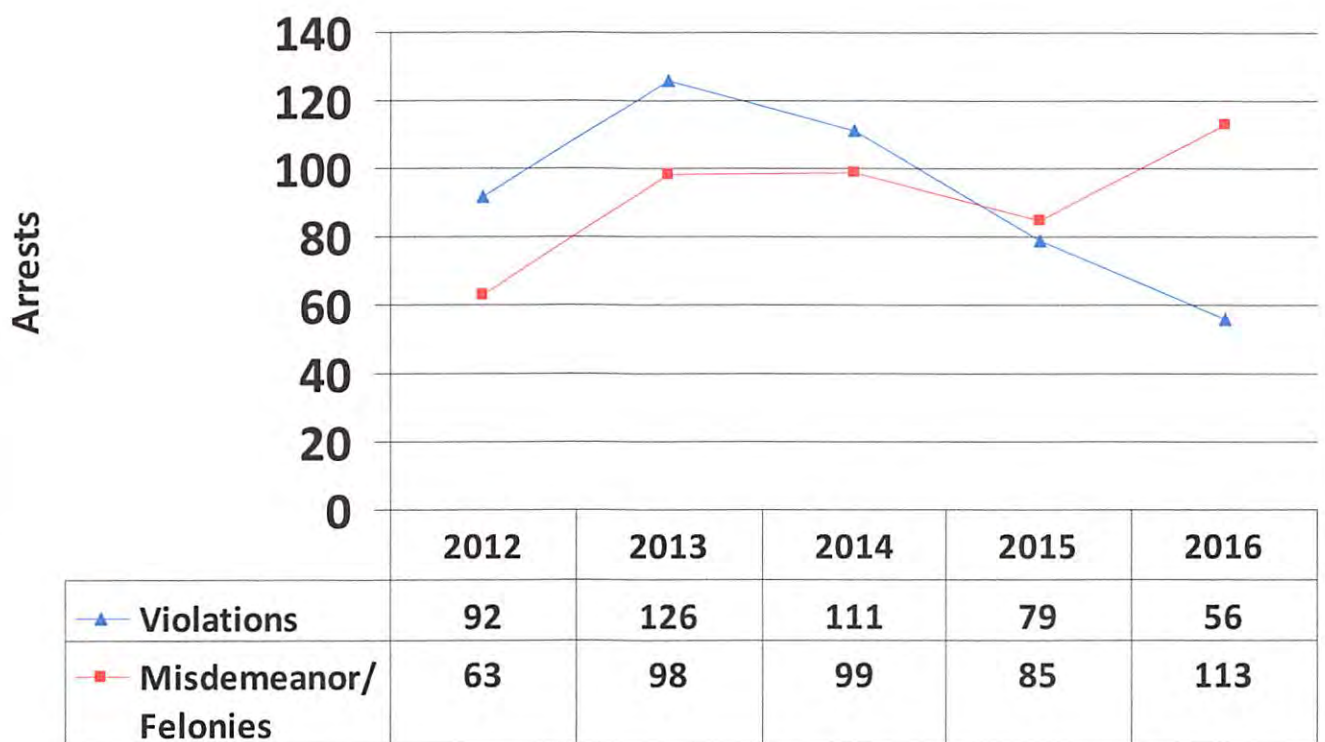

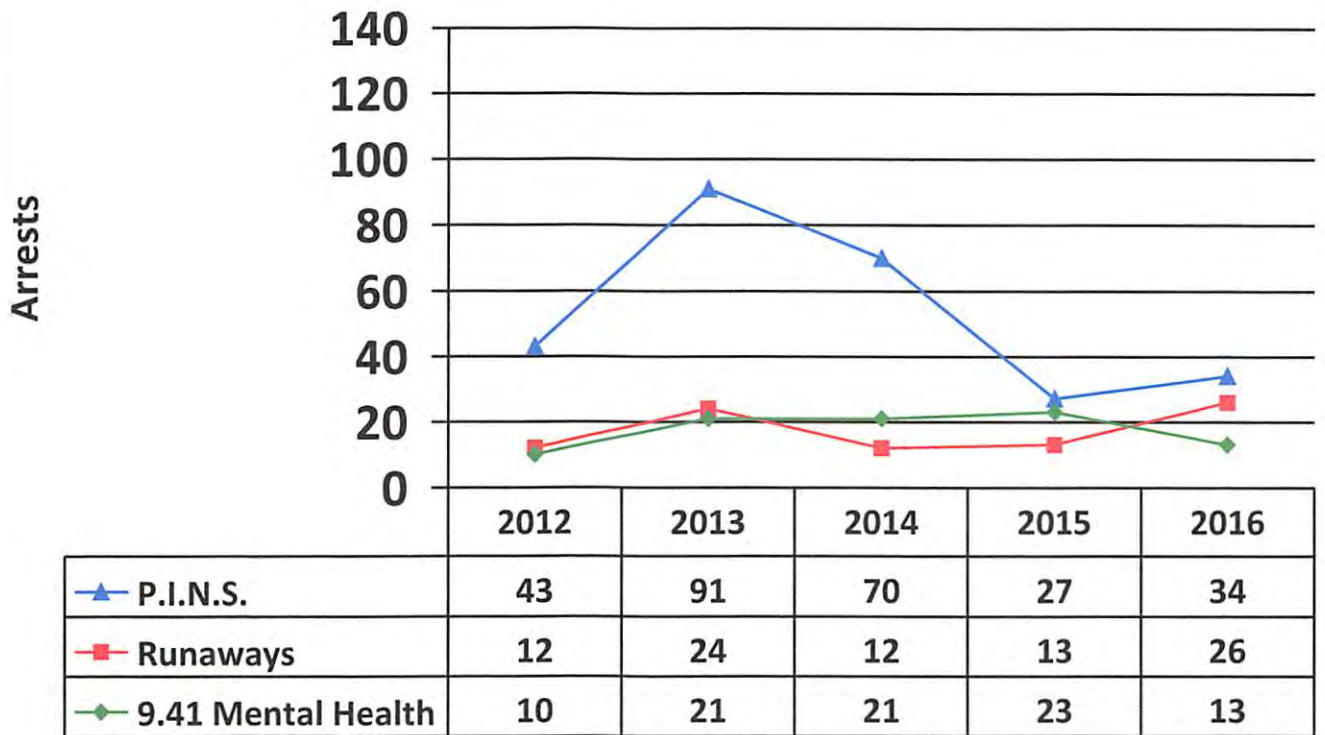

5 Year Juvenile Contact Trend Analysis

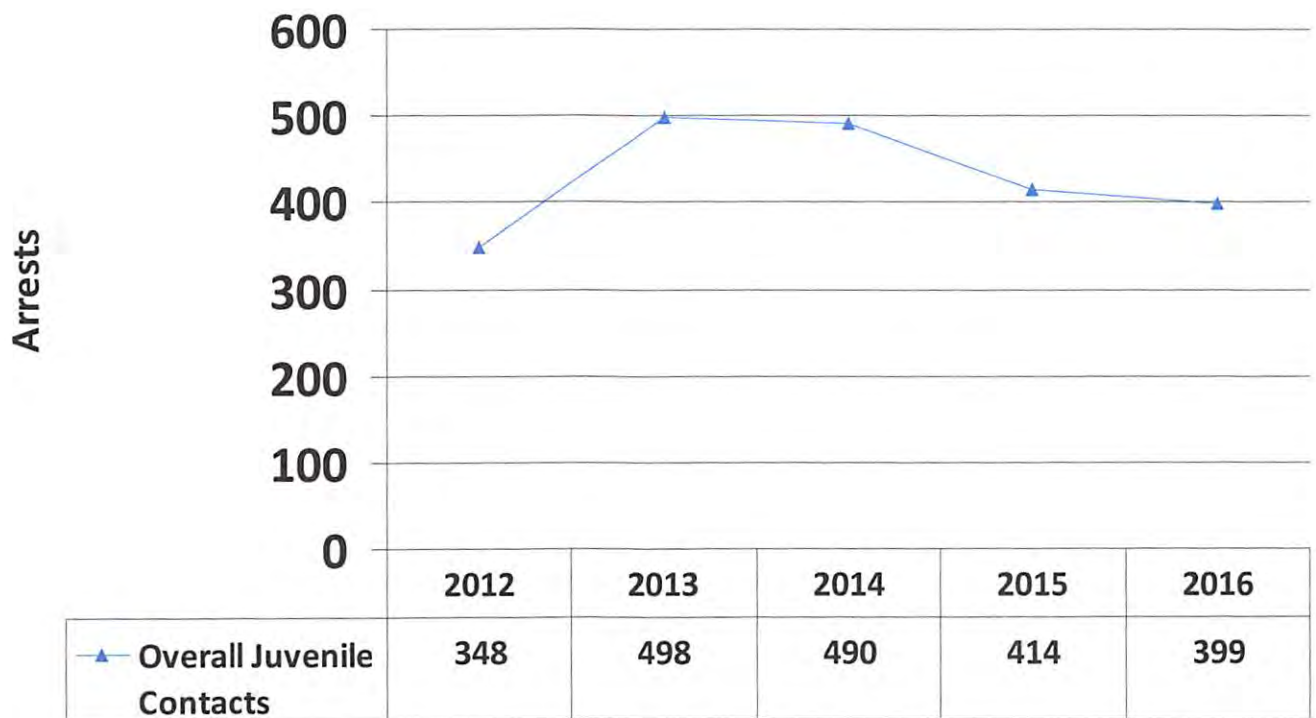

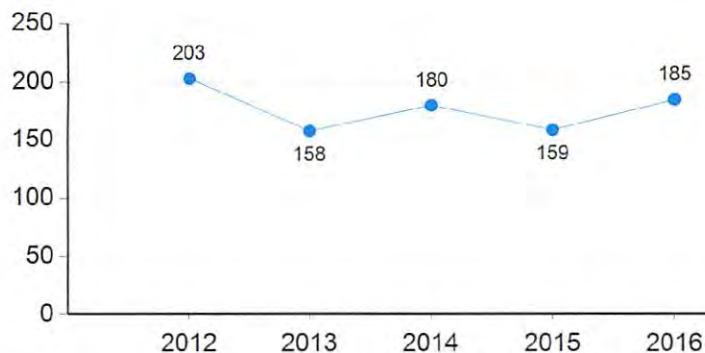

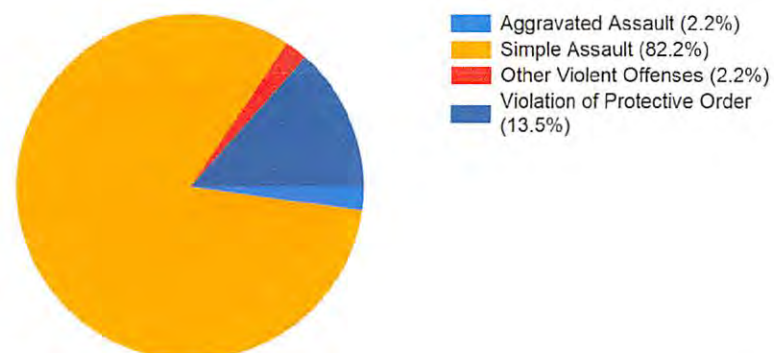

Section 9 - Juvenile Dispositions
Reported Dispositions of Juvenile Arrests (Under 16)

This page presents annual disposition counts for those juvenile arrests reported by your agency to DCJS through the Federal Crime Reporting Program. A juvenile arrest is defined by the Federal Crime Reporting Program as any law enforcement contact with a juvenile for a crime that would have resulted in an arrest if the juvenile were an adult. Due to the differences in how juvenile and adult arrests are handled, the UCR program collects data on juvenile arrest dispositions to capture the initial referral that occurs after a juvenile is taken into custody for committing an offense.

Handled Within Department – Includes instances where police take a juvenile into custody or arrest them for committing a crime but make no referral to juvenile court and do not file formal charges. The juvenile is most likely released to parents or other relatives.

Referred to Juvenile Court or Probation Department – Includes instances where a juvenile is arrested and referred to the probation department or other agency working within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.

Referred to Community-Based Organization – Includes instances where a juvenile is referred to a community-based organization, either public or private, rather than to juvenile court or the probation department and no formal charges are filed.

Referred to other Police Agency – Includes instances where a juvenile is arrested by a department at the request of another law enforcement agency, as well as instances where a juvenile who committed crimes in one jurisdiction but resides in another, and is turned over for handling in their home jurisdiction.

Referred to Adult Criminal Court – Instances where a juvenile is formally charged and sent to criminal or adult court.
