Conversion from Uniform Crime Reporting to Incident Based Report System

As of January 1, 2021, the FBI's National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) became the national standard for law enforcement crime data reporting in the United States. The transition to NIBRS represents an improvement in how reported crime is measured and estimated by the federal government. NIBRS captures detailed data about the characteristics of criminal incidents, including:

- a broad array of offenses
- types and amount of property lost
- demographic information about victims, offenders, and persons arrested
- what type of weapon, if any, was used in the incident.

NIBRS data more accurately reflect the types of crime addressed by police agencies, like simple assault, animal cruelty, destruction of property, intimidation, and identity theft greatly improving our understanding of crime and public safety. The National Incident Based Reporting System additionally eliminates the Uniform Crime Report "Hierarchy Rule" of reporting only one offense per incident and provides the following:

- Greater specificity in reporting offenses (10 Offenses per incident)
- Collects data on 52 crimes across 24 offense categories.
- Increased context to specific crime problems, more detail (victim, offender, offense)
- Identifies, when & where crime takes place, what form it takes, and the characteristics of its victims and perpetrators.
- Provides standardized data to compare crime across jurisdiction.
- Can be used for tactical or strategic analysis for local planning of crime reduction and prevention initiatives.

Armed with such information, law enforcement can better define the resources it needs to fight crime, as well as use those resources in the most efficient and effective manner.

Starting in 2022, the City of Port Jervis Police Department began reporting monthly crime statistics to the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services and the Federal Bureau of Investigation using both the Uniform Crime Report and Incident Based Reporting Systems. The following pages contain vital statistical information pertaining to reported incidents measured in 2022 using both UCR and IBR reporting mechanisms.

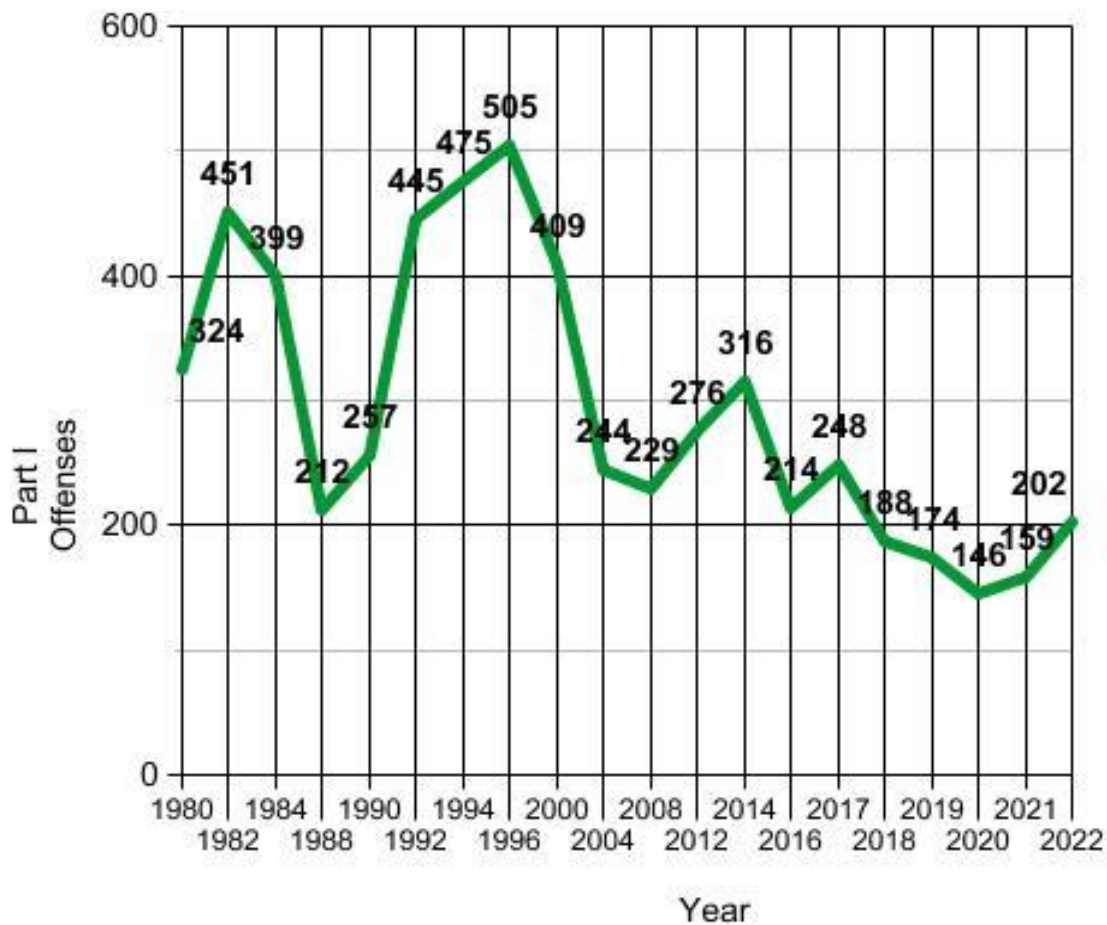

Snapshot Summary- 2021-2022 Comparison

- Historical view- Part I crimes in 2021 are 35.8% lower than 2017 and 68.5% lower than historical high reported in 1996.
- Part I (UCR) Offenses increased 27% from 2021. (60% reduction from historic high in 1996.
- Incidents/Calls for Service -2.53%
- Animal Control Complaints increased 13.25%
- Arrests increased by 23.62%
- DWI Offenses increased 52.73%
- Shots Fired Calls increased 20%
- Overdose Related Incidents increased 42%
- Medical Aided Service Calls increased 9.1%
- Mental Health Assistance decreased 13.8%

- Domestic Violence Reports -8.7%
- Robbery -22%
- Motor Vehicle Thefts -37.5%
- Rape -30%
- Criminal Mischief -8.26%
- Fraud -60%
- Personal Injury Accidents -51.85%

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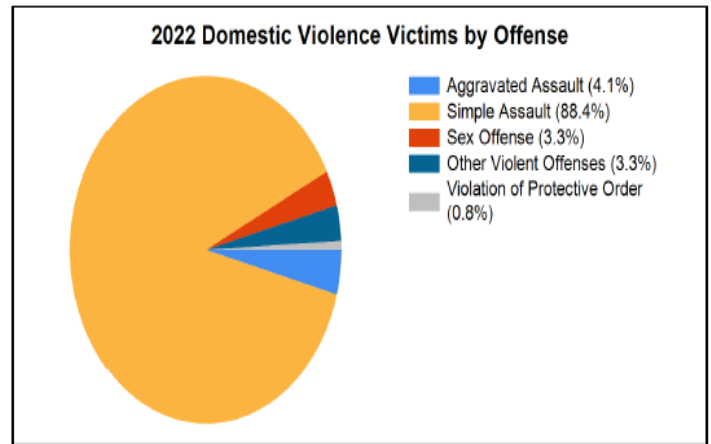
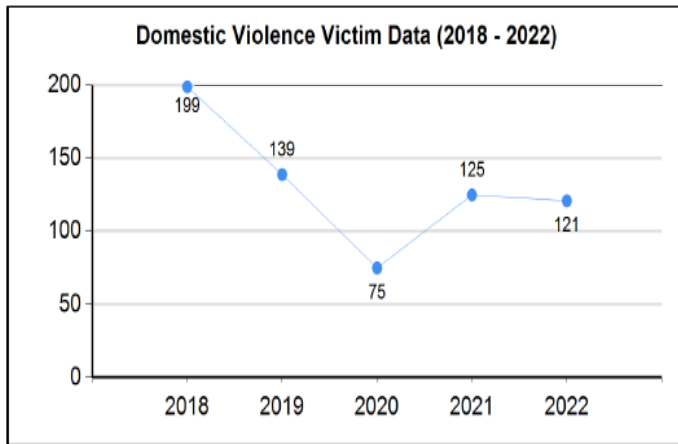

Major Programs and Initiatives

Accreditation through the State of New York Law Enforcement Accreditation Council

- Complete policy conversion to meet NYS Accreditation Standard and seek Accreditation.
- The Accreditation Program is voluntary and designed to improve an agency's effectiveness, efficiency, and professionalism; promote training and foster public confidence in law enforcement.
- Agencies must meet a set of 110 different standards in three categories: 51 standards in Administration, 12 standards in Training and 47 standards in Operations.

Focus- 3 Standards

Administration standards encompass such areas as general management, personnel, and relationships with other agencies. They also address organizational issues such as the agency's mission, the delineation of responsibility, and delegation of authority.

Training standards incorporate many requirements that have already been established by the State's Municipal Training Council. The standards are divided into four categories: Basic, In-service, Supervisory, and Records.

Operations standards impact the ways in which agencies conduct the bulk of their law enforcement responsibilities. Major topics include patrol, traffic, criminal investigations, and unusual occurrences.

Benefits of Accreditation

Provides formal recognition that an agency meets or exceeds expectations of quality, demonstrates that the agency performs in a professional manner, has formalized policies in place to govern its operational practices and procedures, and that its employees contribute to the agency's mission and know what is expected of them. Agencies are accredited / reaccredited every 5 years by the DCJS Office of Public Safety.

As an accredited agency, the process ensures our policies, practices and procedures continual to evolve to address legal, policing and social issues, with program standards revised, added or removed to remain responsive to the needs of New York's law enforcement community.

On December 10, 2022, a large-scale emergency preparedness drill was conducted at Bon Secours Community Hospital involving emergency services from state and local levels of government. Partnerships, planning and training are vital components to developing proactive strategies to prevent, respond to and manage critical incidents.

Formalizing Mutual Aid Response- Enhance Multi-Agency Responses to Critical Incidents

City of Port Jervis - Town of Deerpark formal mutual response agreement to ensure mutual collaboration to address serious criminal incidents, emergencies, provide support.

Goal: Work with Orange County to enter a mutual response protocol with Orange County Law Enforcement Agencies to outline the roles, responsibilities and methods of cooperation and coordination between law enforcement, emergency management, fire, and EMS to improve our response to active threat incidents in our communities.

Citizen Response to Active Shooter Events CRASE

The department maintains several officers who are certified CRASE Instructors (Citizen Response to Active Shooter Events) who provide training to the public to train citizens on how to effectively respond to a hostile incident. The Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) course, designed and built on the Avoid, Deny, Defend (ADD) strategy developed by ALERRT in 2004, provides strategies, guidance and a proven plan for surviving an active shooter event. Topics include the history and prevalence of active shooter events, civilian response options, medical issues, and considerations for conducting drills.

Mental Health Services

2022 Annual Report Detective Bureau City of Port Jervis, NY Police Department August 22, 2022

Introduction

The Detective Bureau of the City of Port Jervis (NY) Police Department (hereafter referred to as the “Detective Bureau”) is comprised of two criminal Detectives, one juvenile Detective, and a Detective Sergeant.

The bureau is overseen by Lieutenant William VanInwegan, Lieutenant Christopher Sargente and the Chief of Police, William Worden.

The year 2022 saw notable personnel changes in the promotion of Christopher Sargente from Detective Sergeant to Lieutenant and the promotion of Kevin Moscatiello from Patrol Sergeant to Detective Sergeant in September 2022. Officer Kyle Mitchell was promoted from the rank of Patrolman to Detective in October of 2022.

Detective Michael Decker and Detective Ryan Kievit served the bureau throughout calendar year 2022. Detective Decker was also assigned on a part time basis to the Orange County Drug Task Force during the year.

The Detective Bureau continued its work of investigating all significant crimes committed within the City of Port Jervis not solved by the patrol division. These crimes include assault, robbery, burglary, larceny, fraud, criminal mischief (property damage), domestic violence related offenses, conspiracy, sexual offenses, crimes against children, arson, and the sale of controlled substances.

Controlled Substances Offenses:

The distribution and sale of controlled substances continues to be a priority of the Detective Bureau. Our city faces a continuing challenge in the sale and use of illegal drugs. The downstream effects thereof are most acutely felt by the drug addicted themselves and their families. But the impact of controlled substances ripples throughout the community, affecting either directly or indirectly the quality of life of so many of our residents and business owners.

The Detective Bureau has learned that the most effective way to address the sale of controlled substances is by developing close working partnerships with other law enforcement agencies that are aligned with our mission. Drug trafficking is a global illicit business, therefore

taking a broad view of the issues at hand and partnering with other enforcement agencies is the most effective method in combating this condition. The Detective Bureau prides itself on its close professional relationship with the Orange County District Attorney's Office. This relationship has been forged case by case over many years of work. We also work closely with the Orange County Sheriff's Office, whose emergency services team conducts the entry and premise security for most of our drug related search warrants.

The Detective Bureau also conducts investigations and works collaboratively with the New York State Police, the Orange County Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the Bureau of Alcohol, Firearms, Tobacco, and Explosives (BATFE), the Pike County (PA) District Attorney's Office, the Eastern Pike Regional (PA) Police Department, and the Town of Deerpark (NY) Police Department.

In 2022 the Detective Bureau completed thirty-six (36) felony level-controlled buys of illegal drugs, and further obtained and executed thirteen (13) search warrants executed in the City of Port Jervis.

Notable Investigations:

On November 3, 2021, Port Jervis Police Headquarters received multiple shots fired call in the area of 120 Hammond Street. Detectives conducted an investigation which revealed that the suspect later learned to be Christopher Sicina fired three gun shots, striking the occupied residence of 120 Hammond Street and then fled the area in a motor vehicle. Detectives continued to investigate the incident over the months and were able to develop Sicina as a suspect and developed probable cause to arrest him. On January 3, 2022, Detective Decker observed Sicinia on Reservoir Avenue where he was taken into custody and charged with Criminal Possession of a Weapon 2nd, a class D felony and Reckless Endangerment 1st also a class D felony.

On January 20, 2022, the Detective Division concluded a lengthy investigation into the sale of crack cocaine and heroin in the city with the execution of a search warrant on Fowler Street which led to the arrest of Jarvis Evans. The search yielded narcotics, packaging materials, and US currency. Evans was charged with Criminal Sale of a Controlled Substance 3rd, a class B felony, Criminal possession of a Controlled Substance 3rd a class B felony. Evans was later convicted at trial and sentenced to twenty years in state prison.

On May 11, 2022, officers responded to 35 Sullivan Avenue for a report of a possible overdose death. Upon officer's arrival they found 36-year-old Steven Stellato deceased in his room appearing to be from an overdose. Detectives conducted a lengthy investigation which included search warrants on electronic devices, social media platforms and were able to gather video evidence and developed a suspect. On March 9th, 2023 detectives made an arrest of Ralph Mann in connection with the death of Stellato. Mann ultimately made admissions to selling the lethal dose of fentanyl to Stellato. Mann was charged with Criminal Sale of a Controlled Substance 3rd a class B felony.

On July 22, 2022, officers responded to 22 Brooklyn Street for a disturbance involving a possible handgun. Officers did subsequently locate a loaded .45 caliber Sig Sauer handgun contained in a plastic black bag at the scene. Detectives conducted a lengthy investigation involving witness statements, photo arrays and DNA evidence which on November 8th, 2022 resulted in the arrest of Butchie Middleton. Middleton subsequently made admissions to having the gun and was charged with Criminal Possession of a Firearm 2nd, a class D felony.

On September 26, 2022, the Detective Division, Orange County DA Office, Orange County

Sheriff's Office, Orange County Drug Task Force, NYSP, Town of Deerpark Police, NJSP, Vernon Township NJ Police, concluded a lengthy wiretap investigation involving a large drug/narcotic trafficking ring throughout the tri-state area including in the City of Port Jervis. The investigation lasted for several months that resulted in the arrests and convictions of thirty-one defendants (31), seventeen (17) search warrants throughout the three states. The arrests and searches yielded the following results: approximately two kilograms of cocaine, 74 grams of heroin, 165 grams of fentanyl, 1600 ecstasy pills, 235 oxycodone pills, 7 firearms, multiple motor vehicles and \$153,690 dollars of US currency. The main targets of the investigation Wayne Smith, Christian Shomo, Joseph Bruno and Andrew Mitchell were charged with class A drug felonies. On December 11, 2022, Officers and Detectives responded to 9 Wright Street for a report of a Violent Domestic Disturbance where a subject was Struck in the head with a hammer. Upon Officers and Detectives arrival a teenaged male was outside bleeding heavily from his head. Officers and detectives entered the residence and took Shawn Beach into custody. Officers and Detectives conducted a investigation which consisted of witness/ victim statements and evidence recovery. Beach was charged with Assault 1st, a class B felony and Criminal Possession of a Weapon 3rd, a class D felony. Beach was later convicted at trial on Assault 1st and two counts of Attempted Murder 2nd.

On December 20, 2022, detectives conducted an investigation into an armed robbery by firearms at 14 Ferguson Avenue in the City of Port Jervis. The victim reported being robbed at gun point and property being physically taken from him which included US Currency, a cell phone and jewelry. Detectives conducted an investigation which led to the arrest of Dominique Croci.

Croci had orchestrated the robbery using two male juveniles to act on his behalf and conduct the armed robbery. The two juveniles were charged in the Orange County Family Court and Croci was charged with Robbery 1st a class B felony and Robbery 2nd a class C felony.

Juvenile Detective Activity:

The Juvenile Detective's mission is two-fold: The first prong is prevention, outreach, and intervention. The second prong, when required, is enforcement.

Recent Raise the Age (RTA) legislation, which now incorporates 16 and 17 year old persons into the juvenile justice system, has dramatically impacted the operations and work load of the Juvenile Detective. RTA further created a new court, the Orange County Family Court: Youth Part, through which we must navigate.

Throughout the year 2022, the Juvenile Detective conducted outreach including the following: Easter Seals Food Pantry assistance, Project Discovery/Candy Cane/Little Lambs Coloring with a Cop, Salvation Army (Street hockey, Family fun day, Trike-a-thon, and food drive), Touch a Truck at Stop, Hop and Roll, A.S.K. tours of the Police Station, A.S.K. Safety Day, PJPB bike rodeo, Church Street Park and Pump Track Jump out party and community BBQ, Children's Safe Stay outreach, Halloween Safety throughout the city (including schools and pre-schools), Operation Be Safe/Be Seen, Project Discovery Thanksgiving outreach, and Christmas Outreach through Easter Seals, St. Mary's and Salvation Army.

The Juvenile Detective also plans, organizes, and conducts a summer Youth Academy, with 27 participants from grades 5-8.

The Juvenile Detective investigated and handled thirty-one (31) misdemeanor and eight (8) felony offenses committed by juveniles in the year 2022.

The Juvenile Detective had a total of approximately 392 juvenile contacts in 2022.

Conclusion:

The mission of the Detective Bureau is to investigate crimes committed in the City of Port Jervis. The Detective Bureau further provides a deterrent effect by demonstrating that every qualifying crime will be thoroughly investigated and, if the standard of proof is met, the appropriate penal

law charges will be filed against the offender. A consequence of committing a criminal action in our city is knowing there will be a relentless pursuit of those offenders by our skilled and capable detectives. Our detectives are on call every hour of every day of the year.

We strive not to cast a wide net, but rather target the very small percentage of the population that commits an outsized portion of criminal offenses. Our task is to identify and focus our investigative efforts on these often violent, repeat offenders, with the goal of disrupting their activities and removing their access to and influence on the community. By keeping our footprint small we create more impactful enforcement on these offenders while maintaining positive contacts with the community.

Our mission is to remain always vigilant in our pursuit of equitable and fair justice. Our real authority can only come from the trust and buy-in from a community that believes in and supports our efforts and views our work as legitimate. The community is the jurors, in the literal sense at courtroom trials but also in their judgment and support of their police. Achieving the support and trust of our community is our goal.

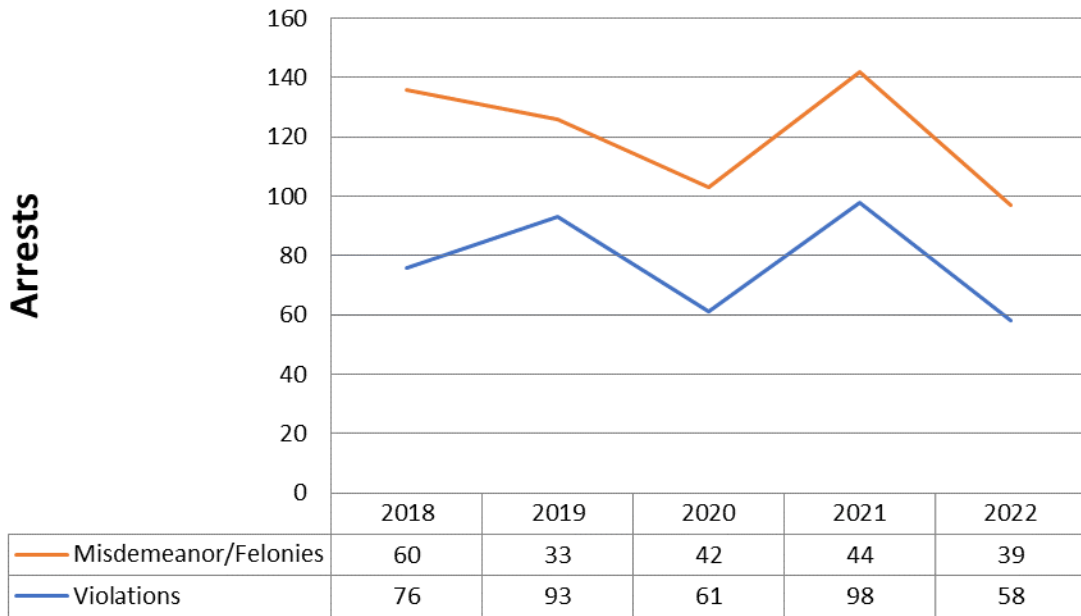

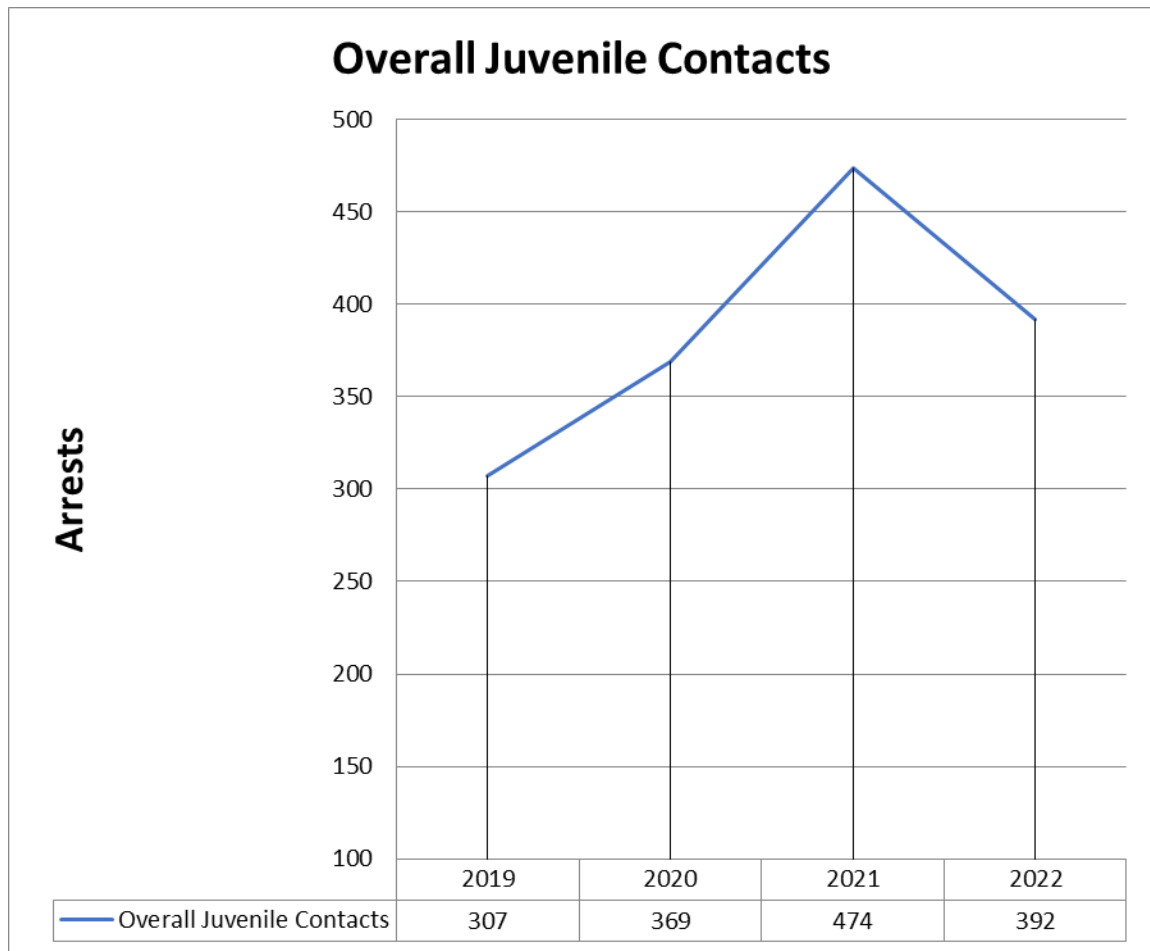

City of Port Jervis Police Department 2022 Summary of Awards and Commendations

The Port Jervis Police Department held their annual awards review by the Department Awards Committee for the 2022 year of service. The Department Awards Committee, consisting of members representing all sworn ranks within the department including Patrol Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant, and Chief of Police, performs an annual review of enforcement activities, major incidents, investigations, arrests, responses to medical emergencies and public service.

Referrals of exceptional acts and service are made to the Awards Committee and each submission is carefully reviewed by the committee members to determine if an award of commendation is warranted and the level of award issued. The committee then refers their finding to the Chief of Police for presentation to the selected award recipients.

The Department's Traffic Safety Program is modeled after the New York State Association of Chiefs of Police Program. It is designed to recognize outstanding commitment to traffic safety with the goal of preventing and reducing traffic related fatalities, injuries, crashes involving property damage and increased pedestrian safety. The Traffic Safety Program operates on a year-to-year basis. The Patrol Lieutenant reviews the yearly reports and presents his findings to the Chief of Police. The types of traffic infractions analyzed are designed to target common accident-causing behaviors and improve overall traffic safety. The Department recognizes six officers in the department for their outstanding commitment to traffic safety and driving while intoxicated enforcement efforts to make our streets safer for motorists and pedestrians.
